



#### Editorial Note

A careful review of the art activities in the United States during the past two years reveals several interesting facts. Among the most widely discussed subjects have been the establishment of a National Department of Fine Arts, the attitude of the art museums toward the public, municipal art improvements, and the International Congress on Art Education to be held in London in August, 1908. Significant, too, is the establishment at the Young Men's Christian Association in New York of evening classes on interior decoration, where salesmen can learn the underlying principles of beauty and harmony.

The purpose of the majority of the newly organized societies has been the cultivation of an appreciative audience rather than the production of artists. Dr. James P. Haney's report on "Aesthetic Training," particularly its development in the elementary schools, has therefore been chosen as the subject of one of the special articles in this volume of the AMERICAN ART

Annual.

Among the museums greater stress is being laid on bringing their con-s to the attention of the public, the union of art and life. The Art Intents to the attention of the public, the union of art and life. stitute of Chicago, situated in the heart of the city, has long realized and fulfilled its obligations toward the public. The movement for co-operation between the Museums of Fine Arts and the schools was inaugurated in Boston. and is spreading to New York and other cities. Of the small cities, Toledo has been the most active in extending the art influence outside of the Museum, and Detroit has attracted the largest audiences to its Sunday lectures.

The Herron Art Institute of Indianapolis has dedicated its new building and important additions to existing museums have been made in Pittsburg, Cincinnati and Providence. The Mark Hopkins Institute was completely destroyed in the great fire, but under the name of the San Francisco Art Institute a new school building has already been erected on the same plot of ground.

In the art schools the department of applied design is becoming of great importance. This is in line with the application of art to industry, of which

The largest benefaction for art during these two years is the Salisbury bequest to the Art Museum at Worcester, Mass., amounting to about \$4,000,000. Other important gifts are those of Mr. Charles L. Freer, of Detroit, and Mr. William T. Evans, of New York, to the National Gallery at Washington, and the gift of M1. George A. Hearn to the Metropolitan Museum in New York, which includes a fund for the purchase of paintings by contemporary American artists.

The most important exhibitions of paintings and sculpture by American artists have been the one held at the Corcoran Gallery in Washington and the annual exhibitions at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in Philadelphia. A notable international exhibition of paintings opened the new wing of the Carnegie Institute at Pittsburg. New York stands first in the number and importance of its small and "one man" exhibitions and its loan

collections at the Union League, Lotos, and National Arts Clubs.

The spirit of co-operation is shown by the traveling exhibitions, which have grown in number and importance. The Society of Western Artists, the American Water Color Society, the Ten American Painters, the Society of Odd Brushes, the Western Circuit, the Southern Circuit, the General Federation of Women's Clubs have each sent out more or less important groups of paintings. The New York Water Color Club sent a group of pictures to London. Several of the museums combined to secure exhibitions of paintings by contemporary foreign artists. These passed through New York in transit, but were not seen, because, unfortunately, there is no organzation prepared to manage such an exhibition.

The craft societies have greatly increased in number, and are widely scattered throughout the country. The organization of the National League of Handicraft Societies, at the time of the tenth anniversary of the founding of the Boston Society of Arts and Crafts, and the establishment of the National League tional Society of Craftsmen in New York, have given a great impetus to

this phase of art.

The possibility of founding a municipal art gallery, through the use of ten cent admission fees as a purchase fund, has been well exemplified at Watertown, N. Y. The pictures acquired from the annual exhibitions were

selected by popular vote.

The growth of the art activities of the United States is indicated by the fact that nearly 600 names and addresses have been added to the Directory of Painters, Sculptors and Illustrators in this volume of the AMERICAN ART ANNUAL. They are new exhibitors at recognized art societies throughout the country, and biographical notes of these artists are here made accessible for the first time. About 400 names have been dropped because they neither replied to request for present address, nor have their names been found in

any exhibition catalog or membership list since October, 1905.

Special attention is called to the list of auction sales of paintings, with the dates of birth and death of artists and their nationality. The information given here is more complete and more up to date than in any encyclopedia. The list of daily newspapers sufficiently interested in art matters to have an art critic, together with the list of art magazines, will be found helpful in securing publicity for art notes. The studio directory for Boston, Chicago, New York and Philadelphia is a new feature. The activities of museums and art societies have increased to such an extent that in order to keep this book within the bounds of a convenient size it has been found necessary to omit certain directories. These will be given in subsequent issues.

The valuable assistance rendered by the Advisory Committee, the officers of art societies, and others who have in various ways helped in the produc-

tion of this volume, is gratefully acknowledged.

#### Aesthetic Training

#### Its Development in the Elementary School

Extracts from the Annual Report of Dr. James P. Haney, Director of Art and Manual Training in the Public Schools, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, New York City.

No phase of school work has more widespread relations than that which deals with aesthetic training. Its importance as a factor in elementary education is yearly becoming more marked. On the side of the individual such training leads to a power of artistic appreciation, to higher standards of living, to a capacity for self-enjoyment, a keener interest in the beauties of nature and to a creative ability invaluable in all industry. Without it there are sealed to him all of those things which together make up the world of beauty. With it there are opened the widest possibilities for enjoyment of the skill of artist and craftsman; painting, sculpture and architecture take on new meanings, and sympathy and interest broaden as he learns to understand the attitude of the artist toward his work. With it there comes a refining knowledge of pattern, color and composition and a delight in the artistic expression of a design as well as in its technical execution. Nature assumes new aspects when seen through the eyes of the painter and reveals herself in moods and harmonies hidden from one untrained. The power of artistic enjoyment is one of the most precious products of education; in a high degree it is self-revelationary, creating a second and a finer self.

On the side of the State, æsthetic training appears as one of the most important agents in our industrial welfare. Our artistic appreciation as a people is constantly increasing and the growing want of the country has made it possible to meet the desire for its gratification. It is, however, a matter of common knowledge that in the past our shortcomings in artistic production have obliged us to import those finer forms of manufactured articles wherein the skill and taste of the artisan have served to multiply many times over the value of the raw material employed. Hence has arisen an insistent demand that our craftsmen be trained to higher artistic skill, to the end that the enormous sums which now flow to foreign markets in return for superior production, may be retained and distributed among our own workmen.

This requirement must be primarily met in the elementary school. Training there affects both the pupil who, as a citizen, is to lend to the demand for artistic manufactures, and he who as artisan is to meet that demand. Such teaching is, therefore, doubly valuable. It trains the child in taste and infuses the element of beauty throughout the school and its work. It gives a desire for that which is artistically appropriate in home surroundings, in dress, and in that wider field which governs the artistic growth of our towns—their monuments, parks, boulevards and architecture. Thus it makes for a finer civic spirit. \* \* \*

In the light of the foregoing statement, the æsthetic teaching of the elementary schools is planned to lead to a knowledge and appreciation of beauty and to an ability to apply this knowledge in creative work. Such knowledge is developed through study of pattern and picture, of form, com-

position and color. This study is practical and is related to the constructive surroundings of the child—to utensils, dress and decoration. In the effort to secure individua! expression a constant necessity arises for discrimination or choice between good and bad forms, fine and crude colors. Taste is the resultant of such discrimination and to develop good taste and the power it implies, is the chief end of aesthetic training. \* \* \*

#### TRAINING OF TEACHERS.

The training of teachers is undertaken through conferences, exhibitions,

lectures, visits to museums and art books in school libraries.

At the request of teachers and principals more than two hundred conferences were held by the director and his assistants during the past year. In the majority of these conferences the work was made practical in character; the groups taught were small, the teachers learning æsthetic principles through actual drawing and making of patterns. \* \* \* In practically every case these conferences were made the means of bringing the grade teachers together to see selected examples of school work illustrating the highest standards of drawing and design obtainable from the pupils of the elementary grades.

Six general lectures on manual arts were given during the year at the Hall of the Board of Education. These were public meetings held under the auspices of the Teachers' Art Club. Notable among the lectures was one on design delivered by Alphonse M. Mucha, an artist of international reputation. \* \* \* A course of thirty practical lessons in design was also organized by the director, under the auspices of the State University Exten-

sion Bureau.

A most valuable aid in developing the æsthetic side of the work has been initiated during the past year in connection with the Metropolitan Museum. A public meeting, called March 15th, 1907, to discuss the more intimate relation of the museum with the public schools, secured the attendance and cordial support of the officers of the museum. The meeting was addressed by the museum's assistant director, Edward Robinson, and later resulted in the museum's extending the courtesy of its galleries to the art department of the schools, to the end that instruction might be given to large groups of teachers in the halls of the museum itself. Pursuant to this arrangement, one meeting was held, which was attended by over one hundred of the departmental teachers of the city. Other meetings are planned for the coming year.

It is to be noted in this connection that the long-time restriction forbidding students to sketch in the museum was removed by Sir Caspar Purdon Clarke. A large number of teachers have since availed themselves of the opportunity to send pupils, or to visit the museum with them, for the sake of studying the invaluable collection, and of making notes and sketches useful in class work. \* \* \* A number of departmental teachers of the city have also taken their pupils to the exhibitions of paintings held in the

galleries of the Fine Arts Building.

The study of pictures, both in the form of canvases, photographs and reproductions, has been related in many schools with the work in English, the children being required to describe in detail the results of their visits to the galleries. In connection with this study of pictures should be noted the recent organization of an association for the promotion of art study, particularly by the pupils of our public schools. The Art Department of our schools is represented on the executive board of this Art Extension Committee, which purposes to organize exhibitions to be loaned to the public schools at the request of individual principals.

At the instance of some of the district superintendents, loan exhibitions of paintings have from time to time been held in the schools of the lower East Side. These exhibitions have elicited the keenest pleasure on the part

of teachers and pupils.

A list of well known pictures is offered in the manual arts syllabus for study in the different grades. These pictures are obtainable in quantity from the supply list in the form of small prints which may be passed from hand to hand. \* \* \* As an aid in this study the department has issued a leaflet apprising teachers of the methods of approaching the work in the class-room. It also has developed a collection of lantern slides (particularly of famous pictures in the Metropolitan Museum) and has employed these to illustrate lectures to teachers and pupils on the purpose and method of picture study. A number of these general lectures have been given during the past year at the request of different principals. \* \* \*

The gradual development of the school library has resulted in the equipping of a large number of the schools with a satisfactory series of hand books on the subject of art history and teaching. These volumes are in constant requisition by the teachers of the higher classes. The New York Public Library has also very cordially co-operated by adding to the shelves of its local branches selected lists of the latest books on color, construction and design. Several of the local branches have also had interesting exhibitions of photographs and prints which have been visited by pupils in neighboring schools.

It is of interest to note that the measures taken to develop a keener artistic sense on the part of the class teachers has served to raise the standards of various phases of school work. In school posters, programs, room decoration and blackboard drawing there is a noticeable advance, made plain by the use of simpler and less florid forms of design, and by increased attention to the development of color harmony. \* \* \*

#### SCHOOLROOM DECORATION.

Not the least important element in the development of appreciation on the part of teachers and pupils has been the effort to raise the standards of schoolroom decoration. Few cities have observed more remarkable changes in school architecture than has our own. Under the skilled direction of our superintendent of school buildings. Mr. C. B. J. Snyder, we have seen erected within the last decade over fifty beautiful buildings, many of which might serve as models of chaste and appropriate architectural decoration. Particularly has the H-shaped building lent itself to such exterior adornment with a simplified form of the collegiate Gothic.

Superintendent Snyder has also given his aid in the matter of school-room decoration by tinting the walls of the halls and classrooms of several of these buildings. In the case of some of them, particularly P. S. 21 and P. S. 40, Manhattan, the classroom walls have, at the suggestion of the Art Department, been divided into panels by wooden pilasters, extending from the wainscot to the picture rail. This has aided in the formation of suitable spaces, wherein appropriate sictures wight he have.

spaces, wherein appropriate pictures might be hung.

In two notable instances (the DeWitt Clinton High School and the Morris High School) large mural paintings by well known artists have recently been installed in the auditoriums. The introduction of these paintings marks a noteworthy step in the decoration of our school buildings. \* \* \*

There have also been placed upon the supply list many suitable pictures which may be secured by principals anxious to decorate the halls and class-rooms. These pictures have been carefully selected with a view to offering such variety of subjects that for the lower grades there might be available pictures of child life, of animals and of attractive subjects chosen from nature, and for the higher classes reproductions of celebrated paintings of a decorative character.

To advise teachers and principals regarding the laws which should maintain in the choice of pictures for schoolroom decoration and for their framing and hanging, the director has held a number of conferences illustrated by lantern slides, which showed some of the well decorated rooms through-

out the city. A leaflet of instruction has also been prepared for the guidance

of teachers, and has been distributed at these conferences.

The development of a beautiful school environment for children who often come from homes of the nost modest description, is an undertaking which it is felt should be carried forward in a most systematic fashion. As an influence in shaping taste and æsthetic appreciation it is of scarcely less importance than the specific work of the classroom. \* \* \* The pictures of a school should be a permanent part of the school equipment. They should be selected not with a view to illustrating the work of any particular grade, but to form well arranged schemes of decoration upon the walls on which they are hung.

Until recently it has not been possible to secure desirable pictures in color for schoolroom decoration. Fortunately, this difficulty can now be met, as colored pictures especially prepared for the purpose are now procurable in number. These prints (by Rivière, Hoch, Volkman, Guérin and others) are not expensive, and it is recommended that they be added to the

supply list.

It is also recommended that in the original furnishing of each new school building the more prominent wall spaces be decorated by suitable pictures. At a cost of less than one per cent, of the amount expended for the building a very satisfactory number of framed pictures could be installed at the time of its erection as part of its permanent equipment. It is urged that such interior decoration is as reasonable and proper as the architectural decoration on the exterior of the building.

# Art Education an Important Factor in Industrial Development

By HALSEY C. IVES, LL.D.,

Director of the St. Louis School and Museum of Arts, and Director of the Department of Art at the Universal Expositions held at Chicago, 1893, and St. Louis, 1904.

(Extracts from the 1905 Report of the U. S. Commissioner of Education.)

The place of art as a constructive influence in the development of civilization, its value in the general education of the people, the important relation which it is to hold as a broadening factor in our lives, are beginning to be recognized. It is even becoming known that to surround the young from their earliest days with the pictured records of the best inspiration and thought that have come down to us from the golden ages of the world's art, is the most certin way to implant in their minds true knowledge as to the grandeur of a commanding people or period, or an understanding of the great lessons in the history of the onward struggle of mankind. \* \*

In pictures nature talks to the mind of man, in the mind's own language, which she has given it; for pictures within mental impressions, whether developed and formal, or realistic, constitute the natural means of communication between man's inner being and the universe without, and on picture impressions, undoubtedly, the mind relies for all its records of fact; it is so that we are formed. \* \* \*

Early impressions from beautiful surroundings become, as the artist's colors in fresco painting, inherent in the substance. As the fresco color permeates the plaster upon which it is laid so that though the hand of the iconoclast may cover it over crudely, yet after centuries have passed the pure and truthful tints of the master are there awaiting but the sympathetic touch of the restorer to bring forth their rich and varied beauty, just so the surroundings of a child, beautiful and ennobling or the contrary, enter into it and become a part of its nature and remain there all through life, to give the possessor clearer, wider vision, fuller and finer life or the contrary. \* \*

Blessed is the man who learns in his youth what art is, for in art is the power of expressing all sentiment and beauty and the divinely gifted genius that interprets wisdom. \* \* \*

If those in control of our art museums might realize what good would result from such a popularization of their work as would bring the ennobling influences of art into the lives of all the people, how much greater they would be than in their competition for the privilege of storing away old masters.

There is also this great truth: That even a little study of nature through art opens the eyes to all manner of truths, increasing the power of observation—the habit of seeing. \* \* \* Art is not for the professional worker alone, but for all the people in all their work, in a large and generous way. There is valuable truth in the saying, "What we fail to see in the world might as well not exist, for it means nothing to us." In teaching the child to draw, we but show him how to see. Whatever broadens the vision of the child lays the foundation for a broader citizenship. \* \* \*

To one who has paid the slightest attention to art matters in our country during the past few years it is very apparent that the growth of a love for art among the wealthier classes has been marked and rapid. The man of wealth now looks upon the possession of fine pictures, arranged in the rooms of his house or in a gallery set apart for his collection, as the proper thing to include in, and this is doing good. The greater field of work, that of applying art to the products of industry, has until quite recently received little attention. Much has been said and written of art education and its influence on the products of industry, but very little has been done toward carrying out the various theories advanced. When we look for results, we find that the institutions doing systematic work in this direction may be numbered upon the fingers of one hand. Yet art education properly understood, is not alone for the development of talents that shall contribute to harmonize the feelings and enhance the enjoyment of the small class of people possessing inherited wealth with which to indulge in the soothing influence of artistic symphonies. Rather it will give to thousands of future workmen knowledge and aptitude which they will use to increase the value of their work, enabling them to contribute more to the wealth of the world and get larger prices for products of their labor, through the influence of its power to advance individual or local interests wherever it is best appreciated, but more than all it will contribute to the elevating and perfecting of American industries as a whole and to the enrichment of the life and the aspirations of the whole people.

To bring about this helpful relation between art and industry, through the medium of our schools and museums, to take advantage of every opportunity to spread a knowledge of art in every way that will lead to the national development of artistic feeling, is a necessity to our country. This means that we must look to the applied arts and develop the application of artistic knowledge in industrial callings. \* \* \*

In seeking to enrich the mind of the workman with a knowledge of what can practically be done in his particular art, whether it be the art of the cabinetmaker, machinist, iron worker, printer or potter, our object should be to increase the man's practical working ability so that he may do better work in his everyday calling. We want him not to paint pictures or model statues, but to be at his legitimate work a better and more ideal workman, therefore a more valuable citizen. We would teach him perfecting of workmanship and improvement of industrial productions, because without the refinement of art all work is crude, because if the workman makes an object not crude nor ugly he does so through knowing something of art, even though only instinctively. In the period long ago when workmen were conscientiously taught and the guilds maintained high standards of journeymenship, objects of common usage made even with the crude tools of their day, were beautiful in form and workmanship, so that we treasure them in our museums and private collections not merely as mementos of ancient times, but as beautiful things possessing a quality which we love, unfound in the things we commonly make and use today. We are sure that the workingman of today, properly educated and trained, could do better work than was done by the workers in the time of the guilds, because, when we have supplied his deficiencies, his power will be far greater than theirs. The aim, therefore, of our most advanced art teaching, is to see to it that our modern workmen excel \* \* \* our modern workmen excel.

In view of this, the extension of art museum work into fields wider than those which have perhaps served the purposes of the past, is the branch of art educational development which promises most for the future. To bring to bear upon our people the strongest and most influences possible for the advancement of art appreciation we must link the educational possibilities of the art school with those of the museum and amplify and extend their activities so far that not only our art students, but the great mass of

people who now seem indifferent, shall be brought within the brightening influence \* \* \*

The great art museum must, then, be far more than an architectural pile containing showrooms where curios and masterpieces, real or alleged, are placed upon exhibition, and vet this is not so far from the popular conception based upon what our museums have represented in the minds of the people. The true art museum exists primarily for the double purpose of spreading the knowledge, appreciation and enjoyment of art and of inspiring its production, first through inculcating popular understanding of artistic truth, then in a more specialized way, through providing bases for comparison, standard of accomplishment, source of inspiration for artists and art students and all manner of workers who can be influenced to apply art in the beautification of their daily productions. With so wide an aim, the art museum is in its nature, even though that nature be not fulfilled. a university-a great center of propulsive education-from which enlightenment concerning art is to be transmitted in all manner of ways to every nook and corner of the territory which it serves, and to every human being who can be reached by its influence. If this, as covering a work broader than our museums have actually engaged upon, seems the definition of an ideal rather than an immediately practicable institution, yet at least I believe it not only suggests the art museum of the future, but also the direction in which our museums are moving today.

To carry out the plan upon such broad lines of activity, the museum must work in many ways. Visitors who seek the museum for purposes of study must be effectively assisted to enicy and understand the works on exhibition, and through lectures delivered in the galleries must be educated in a general understanding of art. Students must be provided with competent teachers who can lead them wisely in efforts to develop their artistic capabilities, and, in conjunction with the exhibition galleries where in permanent and temporary collections exemplifications may be studied, must be class-rooms where students and technical workers may consider in detail books of reference, methods of technique and objects of art work with a degree of intimacy not possible in a public gallery. Intimate relationship must be maintained between library, lecture room, and museum collections. Methods for extending the active practical work beyond the walls of the building, into the public schools and institutions and the homes of the people. must be added. It would seem that it should be necessary to dwell upon the fact that the bringing together of rare examples of art and their installation in galleries, and the admitting of visitors to them, are not all that is required to enlighten the people as to the proper utilization and enjoyment of art and as to how it may be applied to their advantage. The proper installation of well-chosen objects, upon which reliance has chiefly rested for enhancing the influence of our museum, is indeed necessary to successful study, yet adequate provisions for widely extending the educational utilization of the collections are no less important. \*

An excellent form of museum-extension work was inaugurated by the St. Louis School and Museum twenty-eight years ago in the establishment of a system of circulating collections composed of reproductions of masterpieces, through which the opportunity to study art was placed before thousands who could not very well travel to the museum, as well as before many whose observations in the museum galleries were supplemented in a manner to make them much more valuable and to impress them upon the minds of the people. \* \* \* The many directions in which traveling art collections of various kinds may be utilized to great advantage opens up a most promising field of education. This work can not fail to have a pronounced influence upon the future of American art.

Another work that has resulted in great good has been the service which certain art museums and schools have been able to render to the teachers of the public schools. \* \* \* Special Saturday and holiday classes

have been arranged for the benefit of teachers and their pupils, special collections installed with a view to their requirements, and appreciation of the possibilities of this branch of museum work shown in several instances. \* \* \*

Special classes and lectures for workingmen constitute another interesting and advantageous sphere of work through which the development of popular art appreciation may be greatly advanced. Class lectures which have been given to mechanics on Sundav mornings in the galleries of the St. Louis Museum, the objects of applied arts being used for illustration, have been well attended and influential in improving local standards of workmanship in certain directions—notably in wrought-iron work.

There is nothing so very new in these lines of art educational activity. They are all suggested by the great English system having a head at South Kensington, in that museum which has so world-wide a reputation \* \* \*

Art advancement in this country, as a general movement as well as in the detail of method, has still to deal with active opposition. Gratifying to say, however, we find not only that influences formerly antagonistic have been won over, but also that less of the obstructionism comes from the uncivilized lack of ability to comprehend what we are aiming at, than comes from engrossment in other necessary progressive work, accompanied by the fear that devotion to art may detract from possibilities in other desirable directions, a fear which, so far as it is based upon desire for the public good in any direction, melts away as it is learned how universal a factor for advancement art education is.

He practiced the profession of architecture in the State of California for over fifty years, and was for many years the president of the San Francisco Chapter. - CAMPBELL, V. FLOYD.—An illustrator, died at Morton, Delaware County, Pa., April 21, 1906. He was born in Port Austin, Mich., and studied at the Detroit Museum. Beginning as a sign painter he finally became a member of the art staff of a New York newspaper and went to Cuba during the Spanish-American War for that paper. Returning in 1899 he went to Philadelphia and did work there for several local papers and magazines. He became well known through his drawings of the Roosevelt bears which were appearing in the Sunday editions of the New York Times at the time of his death.
- CARDELL, MRS. FRANK HALE.—A painter, died in Boston, Oct. 27, 1905. She was 52 years old and her home was in New York.
- CASARIN. ALEXANDER.—A painter, sculptor, writer and soldier, died at his home in New York City, on May 26, 1907. He was born in Mexico and educated in France, where he later studied painting in the studio of Meissonier. In the Franco-France, where he later studied painting in the studio of Meissonier. In the Franco-Prussian War he volunteered in the French service and was made a Colonel of Chaseurs under Marshal MacMahon. After the war Col. Chase. In his profession he won a high place, among his latest works being the illustration of the modern version of "Canterbury Tales," by Percy Mackaye. He was connected with Scribner's Magazine. Mr. Clark received a silver medal at the Paris Exposition in 1900, and a silver medal at the Pan-American Exposition, Buffalo, 1901. He was instructor in the Art Students' League of New York and was a member of the Players' Club.

He became a member of the National Academy of Design in 1860 and of the Society of American Artists in 1881. He was a prominent member of the Century Association. KRUELL, GUSTAV.—A wood engraver, died at San Luis Obispo, Cal., Jan. 8, 1907. He was born at Düsseldorf, Germany, in 1843, and was a pupil of R. Brendeamour in Düsseldorf. Through the distribution of the preducts of his art Mr. Kruell became well known, and in 1881 he organized the American Wood Engravers' Society, of which he was president. He exhibited the first of his remarkable patriotic portraits in 1890; these included two portraits of Darwin and one of William Lloyd Garrison, and his portrait of Lincoln, which appeared in 1891. Some of his portraits were published several years ago under the title of "A Portfolio of National Portraits." He received an honorable mention at the Paris Exposition of 1980; a medal at the Columbian Exposition, Chicago, 1893; a silver medal at the Pan-American Exposition. LANGEBAHN, AUGUST A.—A sculptor, died June 7, 1907, at his home in Buffalo, N. Y. He was born in Germany, Aug. 28, 1831; had made this country his home since 1852, and settled in Buffalo about twenty-two years ago. Some of his works can now be found at the Buffalo museums, Historical Society. Public Library, Forest Lawn Cemetery and elsewhere. He was a life member of the Buffalo Historical Society and of the Buffalo Society of Artists.

LAWMAN, JASPER HOLMAN.—A landscape and portrait painter, died at his home in Pittsburg, Pa., April 1, 1906; he was eighty-one years old. He was born in Cleveland, O., and early developed a fondness for art, and went abroad to study. He was a pupil of Couture in Paris, and after completing his studies with him he toured Europe for several years. AUGUST.—An architect, died at his home in New York, May 6, 1906. His specialty was the designing of private houses. He was a member of the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

LOPEZ, CHARLES ALBERT.—A sculptor, died in New York on May 18, 1906. He was born at Matamoras, Mexico, Oct. 19, 1869, and came to New York when a youth. He began his professional life in the studio of J. Q. A. Ward in New York, and later studied with Falguière and at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. At the St. Louis Fair the works of Mr. Lopez won a gold medal and his groups exhibited at the Charleston and Pan-American expositions received recognition. He received first prize in a Sun Dial competition, and first prize in a Flag Staff competition, New York, also first prize for the McKinley Monument at Fairmount Park, Philadelphia. He was a member of the Society of American Artists, an Associate of the National Academy of Design, a member of the Council of the National Sculpture Society, and a member of the New York Architectural League.

LOVEY, ALLEN.—A cartoonist, died at Reno, Nev., March 11, 1907.

He was best known in the seventies and eighties for his heroic ideal picture of Christ, a large canvas which has been shown in various cities and was engraved by the artist.

MCCHESNEY, ENSIGN.—Dean of the College of Fine Arts of Syracuse University and professor of music, painting and modern languages, died at Syracuse. N. Y., November 30, 1905. He was born at Grafton, N. Y., 1844, and was the son of a farmer. Attending the public schools near his home, Dr. McChesney entered Wesleyan University in 1864 and was graduated four years later. He then took a post-graduate course in the fine arts at the Boston University, which conferred on him the degree of Ph. D. Then he continued his studies at the University of Leipsic, Germany. He was considered one of the ablest men in the Methodist ministry.

MORAN, PAUL NIMMO.—A painter, died in the County Hospital in Los Angeles, Cal., on May 28, 1907. He was the son of Thomas Moran, a well known landscape painter, of New York, and his mother, who died a few years ago, was an etcher. Paul Moran studied in Paris. He exhibited at the American Water Color Society and at the Academy in New York, but went West about nine years ago.

MOSLER, GUSTAVE HENRY.—A painter, died at his summer home in Margaretville, N. Y., August 17, 1906. He was born at Munich, Bavaria, June 16, 1875, and was a pupil of his father, Henry Mosler, an American who has spent many years in Europe. Gustav Mosler also studied at the Ecole des Beaux Arts and with Bonnât in Paris. He received a third class gold medal at the Paris Salon of 1901 and a bronze medal at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904.

MULVANEY, JOHN.—A painter, was found dead in New York, in May, 1906. He was about sixty-two years old. Mulvaney came to this country when he was twelve years old and worked around the old Academy of Design. He went to the front in the Civil War and made sketches. After the war he went to Munich, where he won a bronze medal; then to Antwerp and later to Paris. On his return to this country he went West and made a study of Indian and army life. He was best known for his picture of "Custer's Last Rally." He also painted many portraits, one of the latest being that of Bishop McDonnell, of Brooklyn.

NEY, ELIZABETH.—A sculptor, died at Austin, Tex., on Junc 30, 1907. She was born in Westphalia, Germany. in 1830, and studied in Berlin and in Munich under Christian Rauch. Among the great men who sat to Miss Ney were Von Humboldt, Von Liebig, Jacob Grimm, Schopenhauer, Joachim, Garibaldi and Bismarck. She joined a band who came from Germany to Georgia to form a colony: when this was broken up she bought a beautiful plantation in Texas. She executed the statues of Sam Houston and other noted Texas characters. She received a bronze medal at the

St. Louis Exposition in 1904.

NOBLE, THOMAS S.—A painter, died on April 27, 1907, in New York, He was born at Lexington, Ky., May 29, 1835, and studied in Munich and in Paris under Conture.

Soon after his return to the United States he was selected by Nicholas Longworth, founder of the Cincinnati Art School, as the director of that institution, and he retained that position for thirty-five years, returing two years ago. He was a member of the Cincinnati Art Club and had received several gold and silver medals.

  NOCQUET, PAUL ANGE.—A sculptor, died on April 4, 1906, on the marshes of Long Island from exhaustion. He was born in Brussels, Belgium, April 1, 1877, of French parents, and at fourteen began to study painting under Jean Portaels. Later he devoted his attention to sculpture and became a pupil of Jef Lambeaux in Brussels. In 1900 he won the Scholarship of Rome in the annual Belgian, competition, but obtained permission to go to Paris instead, where he studied sculpture with Antonin Mercié and painting with Gérôme. He exhibited at the Salon and was made an Associé of the Champ de Mars in 1902. Nocquet came to the United States in 1903 and produced several powerful works that brought him recognition. His bronze group, "American Football," was presented to Columbia University by Mr. I. N. Seligman. He was a member of the Société Nationale des Beaux Arts and of Les Arts Reunis, Paris, and of Ste, Sillon, in Brussels. He was awarded a silver medal at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904. In Rock Creek Cemetery, Washington, D. C., is one of his most impressive works, a bronze seated figure of a woman lost in thought. It is a memorial to Mrs. Hubert Adams, but bears no inscription. He also executed many small portrait medallions, plaques and busts, and the new coinage of eagles and double eagles is from his designs. A vast amount of his work was lett unfinished at his death, but a large part of it had been carried far enough for it to be completed by those who had been working with him. His "infinite power for taking pains" is well illustrated from the fact that it took him twelve years to complete the Shaw Memorial. Many of the pedestals and architectural bases of his monuments were designed by the late Stanford White. Augustus Saint Gaudens received an honorable mention at the Paris Salon in 1880; the grand prize of honor at the Paris Exposition of 1900; a special diploma and medal of honor at the Pan-American Exposition, Buffalo, in 1901; and a diploma with gold medal of honor for distinguished service in art at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904. He took an active interest in the art societies and became a member of the Society of American Artists in 1877, and of the National Academy of Design in 1889; was made an honorary member of the National Sculpture Society, the National Arts Club, the Century Association, the National Institute of Arts and Letters, the Société Nationale des Beaux Arts of France, and an Associate of the Royal Academy of England.

SARTAIN, SAMUEL.—A prominent steel engraver, died at his home in Philadelphia on December 20, 1906. When twenty years of age he found employment the day after his arrival with Richard M. Hunt. Many churches, residences and business buildings in New York City testify to his art, such as the churches of St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Monica's and St. Joseph; the Staats-Zeitung Building, and residences of Thomas F. Ryan, John D. Crimmins and Isaac Stern. He was elected a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects in 1894.

SCOTT, JOHN W. A.—A painter and probably the oldest member of the Boston Art Club, died March 4, 1907, at his home in Cambridge, Mass. Mr. Scott was ninety-two years and two months old. He was a native of Roxbury. He had done a great deal of landscape work in the White Mountains and in the Catskills, and his paintings have been frequently exhibited at the Boston Art Club.

SCOTT, WILLIAM WALLACE.—A painter, died at his home in New Rochelle, N. Y., October 6, 1905, at the age of eighty-three years. For forty years he was a resident of New York City and was well known in the art societies, being a member of the National Academy of Design and of the Royal Academy of Great Britain.

SMITH, HENRY PEMBER.—A painter, died at Asbury Park, N. J., October 16, 1907. He was born at Waterford, Conn., February 20, 1854. Study Clubs of five or more members may be registered with the Division of Educational Extension. This requires that the course of study be approved by the Division; that it shall consist of not less than ten meetings covering a period of not less than ten weeks. Privileges included are those of the use of the Traveling Libraries (fee \$2.00 for 25 volumes); the loan of pictures and lantern slides through the Division of Visual Instruction and

bulletins containing programs of study syllabuses and other aids to study.

The Division of Visual Instruction lends hand photographs, lantern slides and wall pictures to all schools, institutions, and other organizations in the State of New York under the jurisdiction of the New York State Education Department, or chartered by or registered with regents of the University. Fee is at the rate of one cent a photograph, for two weeks or less; for each subsequent week at the rate of 25 cents a hundred photographs; no charge less than 75 cents. The fee for lantern slides is at the rate of one dollar for 100 slides, the minimum charge being one dollar. Large wall pictures are lent at the rate of 50 cents for one calendar year. Duplication of money is allowed by the State on the purchase of approved standard wall pictures by a city (or incorporated village) school system, a union school maintaining an academic department, or a non-sectarian registered private academy.

## THE JOHN-ESTHER GALLERY.

The monument to Francis Scott Key, for which the late Charles L.

Marburg provided \$25,000, is being worked out by the French sculptor,

Antonin Mercié, with the assistance of his son, G. A. Mercié, as architect.

It will be erected on Eutaw Place.

Jean Paul Laurens, the French painter, who was commissioned to do the decorations for the Orphans' Court in the Baltimore Court House, has selected as his theme "The Surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown." The four panels into which the space to be decorated is to be divided will be treated as a whole, ignoring the intervening pilasters. This decoration will probably be placed during 1908.

Under the Olmsted plan for the improvement of Baltimore, it was estimated that \$3,000,000 would be required. The first million has been, or is being, expended, and the Legislature gave authority to the city to issue a loan for the second million, but the people failed to confirm this at the election

in November, 1907.

At the instance of the Municipal Art Society, the Maryland Legislature passed a law providing for the condemnation of property in Baltimore City for establishing esplanades, boulevards, parkways, etc., and for reselling such land, with reservations in the deeds as to the future use of said property.

The Committee of the Municipal Art Society on City Plan, consisting of John M. Carrère, Arnold W. Brunner and Frederick Law Olmsted, has dealt with several practical questions, but little or no progress has been made in

shaping the general city plan.

The Society has arranged for a series of five lectures to be given during 1907-8 in McCoy Hall, one of the University buildings, one each month, from December to April. These lectures are illustrated, and after the lecture a collation is served to promote social intercourse. These lectures are to be given by the following gentlemen: Rev. Henry Spaulding, of Brookline; Prof. Charles Zueblin, of Chicago; Kenyon Cox, of New York; Frederic Crowninshield, of New York; Sir Caspar Purdon Clarke, of the Metropolitan Museum. The subjects of these various lectures are "With Ruskin in Florence," "The Uses of Schoolhouses," "A Master of Decorative Art," "Paul Veronese," "Mural Decoration."

The most interesting work that the Society is occupied with this winter is what might be called the Art Extension Lectures by Dr. John Quincy Adams. A series of ten lectures will be delivered in three different sections of the city, making thirty lectures in all. These lectures are entirely free, and are brightened in each case by the addition of musical numbers. Light refreshments are served at the conclusion of each lecture, to give the audience an opportunity to meet and converse with the lecturer. The titles of the lectures are: "What is Art?" "Art and the Day's Work," "Art in the Use of Things," "The Development of Art Appreciation," "Some Principles in School Decoration." "The Ideal City as a Teacher of Ideal Citizenship," "In the Workshops of a Few Great Artists," "Art in the Streets of European and American Cities," "The Beauty of Machine Made Things," "Franz Hals, Rembrandt and the Other Guild Painters of Holland."

The salon of the National Society of Sculptors will be held in Baltimore, April 4 to 25, 1908, under the auspices of the Municipal Art Society.

The object of the League is to secure the removal of the duty on works of art. In the two years since its foundation fifteen different publications have been sent broadcast throughout the country to newspapers and selected lists. The organizing secretary made several trips through the Central West, where he stimulated active interest in the cause. An unsuccessful effort was made to persuade the party leaders to agree to the passage of a free art bill without a general tariff discussion. Further effort will be made to accomplish this end, and as undoubtedly the majority of Congress favors ultimate free art, it is hoped that success may be secured shortly.

The general purpose of the association was declared to be the advancement and improvement of its members in all matters pertaining to architecture. Beginning with a total enrollment of 18, the organization now comprises 72 active members of the architectural department, and an honorary membership of 17.

The advantages of the Museum have been the subject of many lectures and talks. Outside the Museum, but with the co-operation of members of the staff, a volunteer Committee on Utilization provided in 1906 and 1907 a number of lectures specifically planned for teachers. The Boston Society of Architects devoted one of its monthly meetings to the Museum and listened to members of the staff and members of the Society who are trustees of the Museum. Within the Museum there were given by official arrangement several courses of lectures. A large number of lessons have been given by teachers visiting the Museum with their classes, and, beginning in March, 1906, such classes have had the use of the class room, which does away with the reservation of a part of the public galleries to which all alike should have access. From January 1 to May 31, 1907, there were 110 lectures in the lecture room with an attendance of 2,266. Illustrative objects of the Museum were used in a number of lectures, the lantern in nearly half of them.

A series of conferences in the gallery of the Museum, is proposed for successive Thursday afternoons, at 3 o'clock, beginning January 9, 1908. The first of the series will be given by the assistant curator of Classical Art, who will speak on the Marbles of the Bartlett collection. Appointments with the docents may be made at the door or by letter to the secretary of the

Museum.

Those desiring to know more of the Museum collections and the arts they represent than can be learned in the galleries, are invited to visit the department rooms in the basement of the building. The officers in charge will be glad to give any information and guidance in their power. Of the 60,000 prints, the 47,000 Chinese and Japanese objects and the 6,000 textiles in the keeping of the Museum, but a small proportion are exhibited at one time. The reserves of pictures, of other Western art and of Egyptian objects cannot be seen in the present building on account of lack of space. Almost the entire classical collection is on exhibition.

The work of Museum extension was earnestly prosecuted during 1906. Not only were loans made to sister museums as in the past, but a branch collection of small extent, carefully selected and fully insured, was deposited at Smith College, Northampton, in response to an appeal from that institution. The objects lent by the trustees through the committee on the Museum were chiefly prints and textiles, not likely to be needed for exhibition in the near future, but valuable in connection with the teaching of the fine arts.

Visiting committees have been appointed representing not only artists and other specialists, but chiefly the educated public and they have come in close and lasting acquaintance with the several departments to which they are accredited. Meetings of the staff have been held at regular intervals. weekly or fortnightly. The special exhibitions, the new publications, and the registration of the Museum have here been planned and criticised. Since September, 1906, there has been a monthly dinner of the staff, and on one occasion the staff made an excursion to Lynn to examine proposed methods of electric lighting for the new building.

On December 9, 1905, Edward Robinson resigned as Director of the Museum and J. Randolph Coolidge, Jr., was chosen as Temporary Director.

Mr. Coolidge resigned at the annual meeting in January, 1907, and Arthur

Fairbanks was appointed Director, June 8, 1907.

In the interest of the new building four publications have been issued. Extracts from the literature of museum construction and administration together with original contributions from officers of the Museum, form the contents of the first two numbers of the series of "Communications to the Trustees"; "Observations Upon Foreign Museums" are recorded in the third number of the series; the fourth, issued in January, 1906, is entitled, "The Experimental Gallery." This Experimental Gallery was erected in the summer of 1903 and removed in November, 1905. Continuous experiments were conducted during those two years in the lighting of sculpture and painting under various conditions. At the annual meeting, January 18, 1906, the building committee was authorized to obtain plans in accordance with their recommendations. The work was intrusted to Guy Lowell, with E. N. Wheelright and R. C. Sturgis and Professor D. Despradelle advisory architects. The plans were approved at the quarterly meeting on July 19, 1906. Ground was broken for the new building on the Fenway, April 11, 1907; the contract

calls for the completion of the building by February 20, 1909.

The most important acquisitions during 1905 consisted of the purchases made for the department of Chinese and Japanese art by Mr. Okakura-Kakuzo during his absence in Japan. The most notable gifts were a Greek bronze mirror case from Mr. Edward W. Forbes, an unfinished portrait by the late Alfred Q. Collins, and an oil painting by Charles H. Woodbury, from subscribers, and a series of photographs of national treasures from the Imperial Museums of Japan. In 1906 the notable accessions consisted of the perial Museums of Japan. In 1906 the notable accessions consisted of the Brimmer bequest of paintings, among which are "The Reapers" and "The Washer Women" by J. F. Millet, "Counsellor Dunn" by Gilbert Stuart, "Le Chant d'Amour" by Sir Edward Burne-Jones; three paintings by Monet, "The Apotheosis of a Poet" by G. B. Tiepolo, and a portrait by Phillippe de Champaigne from Dr. Denman W. Ross. The National League of Handicrafts Societies was organized in February, 1907, as the result of a conference called by the Society of Arts and Crafts of Boston to be held during its Exhibition at Copley Hall. At this conference delegates were appointed by forty-five societies from different parts of the country, the League was organized and by-laws adopted providing for the admission of any society approved by the executive committee, upon its acceptance of the constitution and the payment of a fee of 25 cents for each member on its books, the minimum fee being ten dollars. The complete organization of the League will naturally be a matter of slow growth,

but already nineteen of the leading societies have become members of the League. The first work undertaken was the selection of three traveling libraries, each of which consists of about forty volumes, made up largely of technical books on the crafts. Two of these libraries are now in circulation and the third is held at the headquarters in Boston to be used as a reference library by members of the constituent societies.

The Executive Committee has also organized a Traveling Exhibition made up of carefully selected work from the various constituent societies, which started upon its rounds on October 7, 1907, and will return to Boston

in March, 1908.

The present salesroom was opened in 1904, but the needs of the Society soon made it evident that larger quarters were required and in 1906 the adjoining store was secured, so that the Society now occupies the entire street floor of the historic Tichnor House, where long ago Lafayette was a guest, while more recent days found it the home of the publisher whose name it now bears. The annual sales have grown from about \$4,000 in 1901 (the first full year) to more than \$40,000 in 1906, and the staff of one has been increased to five, with extra help at special seasons.

An exhibition of Arts and Crafts was held in Copley Hall. February 5 to March 16, 1907, in celebration of the tenth anniversary of the founding of the Society. There were more than 1,700 regular exhibits and a Loan Collection of 621 articles. The catalogue was notable typographically and for the introductions and illustrations and is of permanent value to those interested in the Handicraft movement. A special feature was the appointment of certain evenings on which the committees in charge of the various departments were present to discuss with those interested, questions relating to the special crafts.

One of the most important outcomes of the exhibition was the organization of the National League of Handicraft Societies.

The actual expense of maintenance for Museum, School and Library was over \$138,000 for the year ending May 31. 1907, which is derived from memberships, tuition fees, subscriptions, and the sum of \$66,755 received (in 1907) from taxation through the South Park Commissioners. The invested funds amount to about \$250,700: the total liabilities are \$176,976.10. The income from the John Quincy Adams bequest of \$5,000 had for several years been expended for books, but during 1906 Mrs. Katherine Adams Wells made a gift of \$5,000, requesting that it be added to her father's bequest and the income used for a foreign traveling scholarship. The administration of the Benjamin F. Ferguson estate was closed May 22, 1906, and the income of about \$24,000 a year will be paid to the Art Institute and applied to public monuments. The Ferguson estate also pays an annuity of \$1,000 to the Art Institute for general uses. W. Moses Willmer died September 16, 1906, and bequeathed to the Art Institute \$50,000 to be used solely as an endowment. Mrs. Mary E. Swan bequeathed certain of her paintings, statues, vases, and books. A bequest was received from Berthold Loewenthal of \$2,000 for a prize fund or other educational purpose. On January 3, 1907, the trustees of the Catherine M. White estate made their final accounting and the Institute has received from the estate a total of \$165,290.87.

The most important building operation of 1907 was the construction of the second floor corridor upon the eastern side of the building, which was begun in the autumn of 1906 and completed in April, 1907, at a cost of about \$11,000. It is at present occupied by porcelains, ivories and metal objects. Another important addition is the new Print Rooms which were constructed in the spring of 1907 at a cost of about \$2,500. The first exhibition consisted of a collection of etchings by Whistler lent by Mr. Bryant Lathrop and Mr. Clarence Buckingham, together with a few from the Stickney collection of the Art Institute.

Mr. Charles L. Hutchinson was elected president of the Art Institute April 27, 1882, and to celebrate his devoted service of a quarter of a century the trustees determined to give to the gallery of Old Dutch Masters the permanent name of "The Charles Lawrence Hutchinson Gallery of Old Masters," and the trustees, as individuals, proffered to the Art Institute a sum of money sufficient to fit up and decorate the gallery in a similar manner to the

fine galleries of the north wing.

The library received from Mr. Ryerson \$1,000 in 1906, for the purchase of books. A complete dictionary and subject catalogue of the pamphlets in the library is now available. The small photographs of architecture, painting, etc., have been arranged systematically and now number 4,411. During 1907 the books overflowed the alcoves, and book stacks have been established

in the large room beneath the library, which will accommodate 75,000 volumes.

The library class room has been moved to a position south of its former one. It is used by art classes with their teachers, who wish not only to con-

sult, but to discuss the photographs and books. One thousand one hundred and thirty-five photographs were taken out in this way in 1906 and 921 in 1907. During 1906, 96 photographs, principally of French paintings, were lent to Oberlin College; an Art Club of Peru, Ind., borrowed for six of their meetings 86 photographs, and 51 were lent to Iowa College, Grinnell, Iowa. One

hundred and two were lent to clubs outside the building in 1907

In addition to the Adams Traveling Scholarship, Mrs. Lillie S. Brand, of Milwaukee, established an annual prize of \$100 and an additional free scholarship was received from the White estate, making 13 endowed scholarships of this character. One of the problems of the school has been to promote the practice of composition. Hence, when in the spring of 1907 it was proposed that the advanced students should execute a mural decoration 16 feet long and 6 feet high—an actual decoration for a public school building —sketches were presented by 23 students. The best of these compositions were carried out, full size, under the supervision of the teachers.

The usual lectures have been given on art, on architecture, and on allied subjects. Gallery lectures upon the collections have been given on Friday afternoons. The third course of the Scammon lectures was delivered in March, 1907, by Prof. William Angus Knight, of England, the general subject being "Outlines of Lectures on a Few of the Nineteenth Century English

Artists." The lectures will be published.

Tanner, of "The Disciples at the Tomb," was purchased from the Stickne, bequest; a collection of 104 examples of historical American pottery and porcelain and about 1,000 examples of textile fabrics were purchased from the Field Museum of Natural History; four small bronze groups of American wild animals by Edward Kemeys, were presented by Margaret S. Watson, Stanley McCormick and others.

Since the organization of this Society pictures and casts have been placed in about one hundred schools. Many other schools have been visited, some of which have already acquired good collections and did not need assistance. In others the Society was unable to help because of lack of funds. It was found that much of the value of the pictures was lost because the

It was found that much of the value of the pictures was lost because the teachers and children knew little or nothing of the subjects, and moreover, had no means of securing the needed information. To furnish the first essential knowledge descriptive labels are prepared, one to hang beside each picture, and a little later lecture courses were arranged by the Art Talks Committee, to be given wherever possible in the school rooms, sometimes to the teachers, sometimes to the pupils themselves. These Art Talks, supple-

mented usually by steropticon views, have become one of the most valuable features of the work.

A small Art Library was placed in the Hamline School when the collection was hung there, and there is a nucleus of one for the Franklin School, given by the Library Committee of the Art and Literature Department of the Chicago Woman's Club.

During the year ending April 13, 1907, the Society sent pictures to sixteen schools filling all direct appeals made up to date. But the chief work was a collection of pictures for the John Worthy School. The eighty pictures for this prison school were shown at the Art Institute from April 13

A number of gifts have been received, including carbon prints and photographs of Western scenery. A gift from Miss Cora Freer of her painting, "The Birthday Party," has been placed in the General Loan Collection. This General Loan Collection has been in the Dante School, and the Lilian Buckingham Loan Collection in the Armour School during the year 1906-1907. In more than one instance the pictures have been so missed when taken away that the school where they had been loaned raised funds to secure collections of their own to fill the void.

Mrs. Mary M. Emery gave \$100,000, to be known as the Thomas J. Emery Free Day Endowment, on condition that, beginning with the second day of February, 1907, the public should be admitted free of charge on all

Saturdays. The use of the income from the endowment is unrestricted.

The Emma Louise Schmidlapp Building, a gift from Mr. J. G. Schmidlapp, was opened May 17, 1907. The administrative work in the museum during 1906 was largely in preparation for this opening, and the expenses of the year included alterations of the old building to connect it with the new. and the redecoration of the entrance hall.

The scheme of the new arrangement of exhibits is to place all the Greek and Roman sculpture in the Schmidlapp Building; approaching the old building to pass into Early Christian, Byzantine, Medieval and Gothic Art; and connecting with this in the old entrance hall, to have the Renaissance and Modern Sculpture. To fill in the series at important points new casts have been bought. The long gallery formerly used for Greek sculpture will be added to the textile section, where the Longworth collection of India Shawls will be a feature. The ceramic section will be greatly enlarged by the addition of the Rockwood historical collection. The library will be moved into one of the wings of the Schmidlapp Building.

The Commission is given control of all matters of art pertaining to the city and county, and its approval is required prior to the acquisition or removal of any municipal work of art.

The Art Commission is an affiliated member of the American Civic Association, Miss Anne Evans having been appointed as its representative in the Women's Outdoor Art League, one of the departments of the Association.

Charles Mulford Robinson was commissioned to prepare plans for civic improvements on January 7, 1906 and a special committee issued a further report March, 1907. Both of these reports have been published. The main business street (Sixteenth St.) has been lighted by ornamental combination trolley and lamp standards, and another decorative combination system is being prepared for Fifteenth Street. Specially designed posts for the fire and police alarm service have been installed all under the supervision of the Art Commission. An ornamental structure known as the "Welcome Arch" was dedicated July 4, 1906. It is built of bronze plated iron, is illuminated at night and spans the entrance to Seventeenth Street opposite the Union Depot. This too was constructed under the direction of the Art Commission but was erected by private subscriptions (\$20,000). Vacant lots have been planted with rye, wheat, etc., in various parts of the city by the Women's Outdoor Art League.

An Esplanade (entrance to City Park from Colfax Avenue) is under construction, also a driveway on Cherry Creek. The Park Commission has purchased for parks an additional 560 acres, including 5 natural lakes, some of the property commanding an uninterrupted view of the Rocky Mountains

for 150 miles, and the Commission has also acquired the right of way for 7 miles of parkways, following the recommendations of George E. Kessler who is still engaged in the work of preparing a report upon a complete Park

and Boulevard system.

The City has distributed free, for Arbor Day planting, 30,000 trees. The Mayor has instituted an annual "Clean-up" day, also an annual Civic Parade, illustrating the work of the different city departments. A City Forester has been appointed -also a Smoke Inspector. The National Humane Society has presented Denver with a handsome granite drinking fountain for horses and dogs.

An auditorium, capable of seating 12,000 people, is under construction, at a cost of \$450,000, and offers the first example of such a building, being erected by the city, authorized by direct vote of the people and paid for by general taxation. The corner stone of a new public library, to cost \$325,000, of which \$200,000 was contributed by Andrew Carnegie, was laid April 11, 1907. An agreement has been reached between the Library Commission and the Artist's Club, whereby an Art Gallery will be provided on the upper floor. To the foregoing enterprises may be added a Public Comfort Station next the General Post Office; children's playground with sand piles, swings, etc., in different parts of the city, under the management of a competent physical director; and numerous minor undertakings.

An Annual Membership has been organized, the receipts from members to be used as a fund for the purchase of pictures for the Museum. The annual fee is ten dollars. Contributions placed in the boxes in the Statuary Court will be used as a People's Fund for the purchase of objects of art. The new library is on the third floor and contains works of especial value to students of art and those interested in the Museum collections. The Librarian is constantly present to give information to readers. A collection of drawings, prints and etchings is also in the charge of the librarian, and will be shown to visitors upon request. The photograph collection contains several hundred photographs of paintings, sculpture, architecture and miscellaneous subjects.

Teachers with classes from the public schools will be assisted by the attendants at the Museum in the study of any department, upon request. It is asked that such requests be made before the visit. Attendance in 1906 was about 125,000. This was for eleven months, as the museum was closed in July.

A special feature consists of the Sunday Talks on art and kindred topics given by the Director in the Auditorium, at 2.30 p. m. A quarterly Bulletin is published. The Handcraft Society of Marblehead opened on the 5th of July, 1906. The Society consisted of ten members and two stockholders. Of the ten members eight did active work. Both members and stockholders shared alike in paying \$10 cash and sharing equally the year's profits. With the \$120 the Society procured an old boat shop for which they paid \$40. The rest of the money was spent on paint, showcases and furniture.

When the Society organized it was formed to meet the demands of the location. Hall's Handcraft shop was producing pottery, hand-woven rugs and linens, wood carving and other crafts, and there were a number of women doing embroideries and fancy work, but there was no place for the disposal of such articles and it was decided to form a society which would meet the needs of Marblehead, both for sale and purchase. Therefore the society embraces the sale of high class industrial work, besides the work spoken of as "arts and crafts work."

It was decided to have a tea-room in connection with the salesrooms in order to draw people from the neighboring watering places, and it has since proved itself of great assistance to the work, both financially and in introducing people to the work the shop was doing.

The tea-room paid the expenses of the season by its proceeds alone. At the end of the year the society was able to pay back to the members and stockholders their ten dollars each and declare a small dividend.

This was perhaps made possible by the fact that the active members each gave a day a week to the superintendence of the sales, etc., so that there was always one of them in the shop. A book-keeper and a girl for the tea-room was all that was required to run the shop.

Dean Weir has made an inventory which shows that the school collections include 213 oil paintings, 567 casts and marbles, about 800 etchings and original sketches by the masters, and a library of about 1,500 volumes. All the foregoing are in addition to the Trumbull collection, the 120 paintings in the Jarvis collection—recently appraised at \$260,000—the Alden wood carvings and other art works. A plan has been outlined for enlarging the school building as soon as funds can be secured, by an extension toward High street. This would allow the collections to be installed on one floor, in four connected galleries, besides adding new space for classroom work. The dean points out that the school has, with the recent Hoppin bequest of \$60,000 not yet available, an endowment of but \$170,250, while the original cost of the plant and collections is more than \$450,000. Their actual value is probably more than double that sum.

The Trowbridge Lecture Course in 1906 consisted of five illustrated lectures by Charles H. Caffin on "The Tendencies of Modern Painting"; in 1907 lectures were given by Kenyon Cox, Cass Gilbert, Lorado Taft, Grosvenor Atterbury and Ralph Adams Cram. On December 13, 1906, Professor John F. The donations of coins, medals, etc., during the year has been unusually

large. The Numismatic Library is the largest in this country.

The following are the most important things accomplished during the

past two years:

In 1906, after six years' unsuccessful effort, the Society was enabled by the heirs of the late Andrew H. Green to secure to the State of New York the beautiful Watkins Glen for a State Reservation. The sum paid for the property by the Green estate was \$46,512. The reservation is in the official custody of the Society.

The Hon. William Pryor Letchworth, of Portage, N. Y., deeded to the

State of New York his magnificent estate of Glen Iris, embracing the three

beautiful falls of the Upper Genesee River and 1,000 acres of property upon which he has expended over half a million dollars. This gift was accepted by the Legislature of 1907, and by the terms of the act is to be in the

custody of this Society.

In 1906, after four years' effort of this Society, the Legislature of New York passed a bill extending the jurisdiction of the Interstate Palisade Park Commissioners so as to permit the extension of the Palisade Drive to Stony Point Park and preserve the impressive Hook Mountain from destruction by the traprock quarrymen.

The Society assisted in securing the passage of the Burton bill for the preservation of Niagara Falls and in securing the repeal by the Legislature

of four charters for the diversion of water from Niagara Falls.

In 1906 the Legislature passed a bill drafted by the Society for the acquisition by the State of the historic blockhouse and colonial residence of Sir William Johnson, in Johnstown, N. Y. It is now in the custody of the Johnstown Historical Society.

In 1907 the first fruits of five years' compaigning against the poster nuisance appeared in the contracts for the new subways in New York City, which forbid advertisements in the new underground railway stations.

The first meeting was held May 4, 1907. The object of the committee is to foster a general interest in art and to extend the appreciation thereof by circulating exhibitions in schools, settlement houses, and clubs; by organizing art study clubs, with lectures and excursions to points of artistic interest; and in every possible way to co-operate with existing organizations, both

art societies and lay, to instil a love for beauty in every form.

Photographs of "Points of Artistic Interest in New York City" were shown at the Hebrew Technical School for Girls, Second Avenue and 15th Street, from July 10 to September 1, 1907. Meetings were held every Wednesday, usually consisting of a twenty-minutes "Talk," followed by an excursion under the guidance of the secretary. Some of those who gave "Talks" were Dr. J. Q. Adams, secretary of the Art Commission of New York, Dr. Daniel Huebsch, and the architect, Thomas Tryon. Mr. Tryon gave two blackboard lessons in "Observation."

On September 4 an exhibition was opened of photographs of objects at the Metropolitan Museum. They were arranged in groups to give an idea of the various departments of the Museum. The photographs were lent by the Metropolitan Museum but framed by the committee. The girls were taken in groups to the Museum.

The first Art Study Centre was established by the Woman's Evening Club of the Ethical Culture Society. It meets once a month at the Museum

and once a month at the club rooms.

The Art in Trades Club is an organization composed of men employed in the large decorating and furnishing stores of New York City. It is the outcome of the classes in "Decorating and Furnishing" given at the West Side Branch of the Young Men's Christian Association, by Frank Alvah Parsons. Faith in the efficiency of a practical art knowledge for the business man, and the desire to continue the work of the classes into special fields, prompted the organization of this club.

The membership is about 100 and numbers some of the strongest men in the best houses of the city. The club has two meetings a month, one for free discussion and one at which prominent men in special fields give an address on their particular subject. Among those who have spoken to the club are George B. Post, the architect, and Sir Purdon Clarke, of the Metropolitan Museum.

The club hopes to influence the general taste standard in the trade and to reinforce any movement in public education or adult life that leads to a betterment of conditions in the home and in public buildings.

The Commission was established by the Charter of the City of New York, adopted in 1897. An amendment to the charter, which went into effect July 20, 1907, provides that no structures or works of art shall become the property of the City of New York without the approval of the Art Commission. Formerly only designs for structures costing less than one million dollars needed to be passed upon unless the Mayor specially referred them to the Commission; now all structures must be passed upon by the Commission regardless of cost. The new law also provides that the presidents of the Metropolitan Museum, the New York Public Library, and the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Letters may appoint one of their trustees to represent them on the Art Commission.

The collection of books, pamphlets, photographs and prints on civic art in Europe and America contains 275 bound volumes, 101 maps and about 2,400 photographs and prints relating to about 100 cities. A thorough card catalogue has been prepared. The reports for 1904 and 1905 contained tentative lists of works of art belonging to the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

The club house is open to members from 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. It is an organization of women artists and models, designed to give these art workers opportunities for association and mutual benefit. The dues are two dollars a year; initiation fee, one dollar. May, 1907, there were 296 artist members, 161 models, 180 subscribers, 67 associates, 23 contributors; a total of 727. The attendance of members during the year has been 15,797, and there were 5,307 callers, a total of 21,104.

The employment bureau for women models is open daily, except Sundays, from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. The bureau may be used by members without charge, and by men artists by the payment of an annual subscription fee of two dollars. During the year ending May. 1907, 1,325 posing engagements were placed; also, other employment was found for certain members who were unsuited for posing.

The Costume Bureau is for the renting of gowns for use in posing. They are rented to members and subscribers to the Employment Bureau. Orders also are taken for making costumes for artists at moderate prices. This department is open daily, except Sunday, from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. The prices for renting gowns range from fifty cents to two dollars a week, and from ten to twenty-five cents a day. The club has received during the year an income of \$809.14 from the renting and making of gowns.

During the year 1,123 breakfasts were served, 7,000 luncheons (at 15c), and 6,931 dinners (at 30c), a total of 15,144. Tea has been served free to 5,933 persons. Receipts from meals served were \$3,582.13, and disbursements for restaurant and afternoon tea, \$3,573.24.

The Circulating Library contains 500 volumes. A Penny Provident Fund station was open at the club during the winter months from 4 to 6 p. m., Saturdays. Total number of depositors, 70. Various entertainments, such

as song recitals and other musicals, lectures and theatricals, have been given

monthly.

The annual sale of decorative art work for the benefit of the club is held in December. The Annual Loan Exhibitions of Pictures, organized by the club in co-operation with the University Settlement, were held at the Settlement Building, Eldridge Street, in April, 1906, and in 1907.

During the winter of 1907-1908 a course of six lectures on "Drama" will be given by Miss Kate Thompson, and French classes, free to all members,

meet at the club rooms various evenings in the week.

The Museum is open on week days from 9 to 6, on Sundays from 2 to 6, and on Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:45. On Mondays and Tuesdays an admission fee of twenty-five cents is charged. At all other times admission is free. The number of visitors during the year 1905 was 121,584; during the year 1906 it was 143,047. It must be borne in mind that the Museum is a general Museum and that this attendance represents interest in the Natural History and Ethnology Departments as well as in the Department of Fine Arts, to which this notice is confined

On November 10, 1907, the picture galleries of the recently completed third section of the Museum Building were opened to the public. By this addition to the building, the hanging space has been doubled and three new galleries have been opened, respectively 110 by 38 feet, 13 by 38 feet and 42 by 42 feet. This is the first enlargement of the picture galleries since the original opening of the Museum in 1897; as the second or central section, opened in June, 1905, contained only galleries for casts and none for paintings. Notwithstanding the great increase of hanging space, all the new galleries were filled with paintings at their first opening.

In the re-arrangement and re-classification, which the enlargement of the building has made possible, the new eastern square gallery and the new adjacent small gallery are wholly devoted to paintings by the Old Masters.

The new eastern long gallery is wholly devoted to contemporary Nineteenth Century European pictures. The original long gallery, now the Western long gallery, is wholly devoted to contemporary American paintings. The adjacent gallery (the original entrance gallery) is wholly devoted to early and historic American art. The smaller western gallery is hung with historic American portraits and with miscellaneous exhibits.

The only installation which remains unchanged is that of the Tissot

Collection in the Western Square Gallery.

The number of paintings by Old Masters on exhibition is ninety-four, the contemporary and Nineteenth Century European pictures number one hundred and twenty-nine, the recent American pictures number one hundred and thirteen, the historic American pictures number forty-five, the Tissot Collection numbers 360 pictures, which are not included in the foregoing enumeration. Aside from the Tissot Collection the whole number of paintings owned by the Museum and now on exhibition is one hundred and seventy-two.

The Antique Cast Collection remains substantially as described in the

previous reports with some few important additions.

In the opening of the new eastern wing which was formally made for all its departments on December 14, four weeks later than the opening of the picture galleries, three new halls have been provided for the Art Departments on the first floor, which are assigned to the expansion of its miscellaneous art collections. They were filled with exhibits at the time of

opening and further installations are in progress.

The reports for 1905 and 1906 show that the accessions both of paintings and of objects of art of all classes have been numerous. The accessions of 1905 included eight valuable paintings, three pieces of statuary, three hundred and sixty-eight specimens of antiquities, seventy-eight specimens of ceramics and nineteen miscellaneous art objects. The archæological specimens included a collection of Greco-Roman gold jewelry, a series of Roman pavement mosaics, small collections of Tanagra figurines and of Egyptian bronzes and a collection of Egyptian antiquities purchased for the Museum by Dr. Wm. M. Flinders Petrie.

Among the accessions mentioned by the Report for 1906 is a bequest of fifty-five paintings from Mrs. Caroline H. Polhemus, including examples of Vibert, Meyer von Bremen, Escosura, Merle, Bridgman, Verboeckhoven, Casanova, Carleton Wiggins, Edouard Frère and many prominent artists of

the last generation.

The report otherwise makes special mention of a Couture, of an ancient Sienese altar-piece by Sano di Pietro, of a portrait by Fantin-Latour and of a full-length portrait by Whistler. The gifts included eleven good school examples by Seventeenth Century Spanish and Italian masters: three large paintings by Verestchagin and a large canvas by the old Dutch painter Jurian Ovens, also pictures by R. Swain Gifford, E. Irving Couse, Louis C. Tiffany, Winslow Homer, Gabriel Max, and a portrait of the German Emperor, presented by himself. The purchases included pictures by the American painters Dearth, Carlsen and Cornoyer.

The cast accessions included the Moses, Pietà, Captives, and Tombs of the Medici by Michael Angelo: the St. George by Donatello and an antique Jason. Egyptian antiquities, Saracenic pottery, old European china and a marble replica of the Bacchante by MacMonnies are also mentioned.

The Museum exhibits include a large collection of framed architectural photographs, enlargements from negatives taken by the Curator of Fine Arts. This collection has recently been considerably augmented. Three Memoirs have been published by the Museum to explain and supplement this collection. Important exhibitions of these photographs were made in 1905, at Rome and at Edinburgh, under the auspices of the architectural societies of those cities.

On February 5, 1906, negotiations were completed whereby the School of the National Academy of Design became affiliated with Columbia University. The Academy continues to exercise complete control over its School of Fine Arts, but the students have certain advantages at the University. In time, it is proposed that the School shall occupy its own building within the University campus.

The Fine Arts Faculty has been formed through action of the authorities of the University, the National Academy of Design and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. It consists of the School of Architecture of Columbia, without material change; a School of Design comprising painting, sculpture and decoration, which is now the Academy School; a School of Music, the present department of Columbia, and perhaps in the future a School of Belles-Lettres.

In May, 1896, the Museum for the Arts of Decoration was formally opened for the use of the public.

The space occupied at that time consisted of the South and West galleries and a portion of the North Bay Window on the fourth floor. After ten years the Museum covers the whole fourth floor. In time, as the space allowed the Museum cannot be increased, it will become crowded, but as objects of better quality are given or purchased, it will be possible to arrange small collections, illustrating the various trades and lend them to towns trying to form industrial museums.

There have been numerous gifts of money, paintings, art objects, books

and material for the scrap books.

A chronological and comparative arrangement has been adopted, showing as far as possible in each artistic trade the work, side by side, of various countries at the same period. The scrap books now number 655, the reference books 826.

Applications to have objects taken from the cases to work from increase each month. Manufacturers and designers from other towns constantly consult the Morgan collection of textiles; actors and dressmakers find costume designs; and to publishers, authors and designers it is a

fruitful source in inspiration.

Since the first years, double the number of people have worked in the Museum, and during 1906 six times as many students from the Cooper Union Day and Night Schools, as well as from the following schools, have worked in the Museum, frequently under the tuition of their own masters—New York School of Art, Manhattan Trade School for Girls, New York Industrial School, New York School of Applied Design for Women, Public School Domestic Science Teachers, School of Commercial Drawing, School of Commercial Drawing, School of Commercial Drawing, School of Commercial Drawing, Sc Association. The Museum is open daily from 10 a. m. (Sunday from 1 p. m.) to 5 p. m. and on Saturday until 10 p. m. Admission is free, except on Mondays and Fridays, when a fee of 25 cents is charged to all except members and copyists.

Teachers of the public schools, endorsed by their principals, receive from the secretary, on application, tickets admitting them, with six pupils apiece, on pay days. Teachers in art and other schools receive similar tickets on application to the assistant secretary. 1.093 applications were received in 1905, the first year this privilege was accorded. Teachers, on application to the assistant secretary, may make arrangements for the use of a class room, and help will be given in the preparation of talks. This class room was opened in November, 1907.

Requests for permits to copy and to photograph in the Museum should be addressed to the assistant secretary. No permits are necessary for sketch-

ing and for the use of hand cameras.

The Library, entered from Gallery 15, containing upward of 12.000 volumes, chiefly on art and archæology, is open 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. daily, except Sundays, and is accessible to students and others. A collection of photographs of musical instruments, ancient and modern sculpture, architecture, painting and the industrial arts will be found here. The Edward D. Adams collection of photographs of architecture and sculpture of the Renaissance will be found in Room 32.

The publications of the Museum, now in print, number twenty-three. These are for sale at the entrance to the Museum and at the head of the main staircase. A monthly Bulletin was started November 1, 1905. It is sent free to all members. To others the subscription is one dollar a year. It is published under the direction of the secretary, and its editor is the as-

sistant secretary, Henry W. Kent.

Many changes have been made in the arrangement of the collections, all looking toward their greater usefulness and intelligibility. The recent accessions in woodwork have been brought into two of the rooms at the right of the hall, together with the Coles Collection, the tapestries from which have been hung here. The Greek bronzes of all kinds have been collected in one room in the southeast corner of the main floor, where they fall into relation with other classical antiquities. The exhibit of lâces, with many valuable additions, has been rearranged by an expert in a room especially prepared for it, and in close relation with the room containing textiles. The collection of modern European and Oriental Glass, formerly in the hall of entrance on the Park side of the building, has been removed to a room connecting with other rooms containing ceramics, and also with the Moore Collection, which embraces many fine specimens of glassware. The Moore bequest has itself been rearranged for the better classification and exhibition of this interesting group of objects. By the bringing together of several collections, the exhibit of arms and armor will assume the appearance that belongs to it by reason of its importance. Some interesting Oriental armor has been added. The metal objects, particularly those in the precious metals found in the "Gold Room," have been reclassified and rearranged to show them more effectively.

Many changes have been made in the galleries devoted to paintings. In April, 1906, Gallery 24 was newly decorated and hung with pictures chosen from among the various collections for their importance and for their decorative value in the room, without regard to their school, as a kind of object lesson. The adjoining room has been given to pictures of the English school; the Marquand Gallery has been rehung with paintings of the German, Dutch and Flemish schools, and a third room has been allotted to the early French, German and Italian masters, or "Primitifs." Two galleries which formerly contained American paintings, together with examples of other schools, have now been given entirely to American artists. The Hearn Fund paintings are found here, in Gallery 13.

The rearrangement of all these collections has furnished occasion for the withdrawal of many objects, and has given an opportunity to label those that remain. In order that the large number of accessories referred to in the Bulletin, either by special note or brief mention, may easily be found by those desirous of seeing them, a room has been arranged for their exhibition, from month to month, before they are distributed among the collections to

which they belong.

Excavations were begun on April 2, 1906, for the new north wing. The further extension of this wing on the Fifth Avenue front has been authorized. The trustees have also authorized the construction of a new wing to accommodate the library, which has entirely outgrown its present accommodations. The estimated cost of this library wing is about \$75,000. When completed it will release for administrative purposes the space it now occupies.

A letter from Mr. George A. Hearn, under date of January 11, 1906, set forth the terms of his generous gift of thirty-eight paintings and the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, the income of which is to be used for the purchase of paintings by artists now living, who are, or may be at the

time of purchase, citizens of the United States.

Among the accessions by gift, two besides the gift of Mr. George A. Hearn deserve especial mention, not because they are the most valuable, but because of the personal relation which prompted them. The one is the gift by Mr. William T. Blodgett and Miss Blodgett of four paintings, by Constable, Gainsborough, Reynolds, and Romney, respectively, in memory of their father, Mr. William Tilden Blodgett, one of the founders of the Museum. The other is the gift by Madame Paul Dubois of four casts from important sculptures of her husband, whose reputation was international, and to whose memorial our own countrymen have contributed.

Gratifying progress has been made in the effort to increase the collection of representative American art, both in the department of painting and that of sculpture. Thirty-three pictures and twenty-eight bronzes were added during 1006 from the hands of American painters and sculptors. Among

the more important are the following:

The gift of Mr. Hearn already referred to, which contained thirteen paintings by American artists: "Carmencita," by William M. Chase, the gift of Sir William Van Horne; the "Nocturne in Green and Gold (Cremorne Gardens)," by James McNeill Whistler, the gift of Mr. Harris C. Fahnestock: "Girl and Cow," by Theodore Robinson, the gift of Mr. William T. Evans; "The Mares of Diomedes" (bronze group), by Gutzon Borgfum, the gift of Mr. James Stillman; Portraits of Indians (bronze medallions), by Olin L. Warner, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick S. Wait.

The tentative lists of some of the best known American painters and sculptors, who either are not at all or are not adequately represented in the collections, have been corrected to date, and are repeated in an appendix to

the 1906 report.

The Lazarus Scholarship is in charge of the Museum. It consists of \$1,000 a year for three years' European study of mural painting. The scholarship was awarded to Paul Chalfin, on December 2, 1905, who had been

curator of the Department of Chinese and Japanese Art at the Boston Museum since April, 1903. The next award will be in October, 1908. (See Vol II, p. 23.) For information address P. C. Sus, Clerk of the National Academy of Design, Amsterdam Avenue and 109th Street, New York.

The above officers were elected at the annual meeting held at the National Arts Club, November 11, 1907, the date having been changed from the spring

to the second Monday in Nevember.

The work of the Society has during the past two years consisted chiefly of its annual exhibitions held in the galleries of the National Arts Club. The fifth annual exhibition was held March 21 to 31, 1906; the sixth, March 13 to 31, 1907. Many of the city departments were represented. The various committees, there are over thirty, have kept in close touch with the city authorities. A poster exhibition was held April 2 to 14, 1906, the society's idea being to raise the standard of art in advertising and to demonstrate the

possibility of combining real art with utility.

The subject for discussion at the dinner given December 19, 1905, was "Municipal Ownership as Expressed in Forms of Art"; on March 20, 1906. "Our City"; December 18, 1906, "Greater New York and Its Future Possibilities"; March 20, 1907, "Greater New York and Its Future Expressed in Terms of Art." The society co-operated with the Art Commission of the city in the selection of the works of art, public buildings, bridges, etc., belonging to the municipality, to be photographed by the commission as a permanent record. Also co-operated with the Tree Planting Association for city embelsihment. The Flower, Vine and Area Planting Committee (Mrs. E. Hagerman Hall, chairman), distributed nasturtium and morning-glory seeds to over 1.400 children connected with the 28 kindergartens of New York City. This committee made an effective exhibit of their window boxes at the convention of the New York City Federation of Women's Clubs at the Hotel Astor in May, 1907. The committee also presented a tree to the Morris High School, and planted a good deal at the University Settlement. East 104th Street.

The society instituted a competition for two mural paintings to decorate the Morris High School, 166th Street and the Boston Road. Twenty-nine pairs of sketches were submitted and on May 21, 1006, the first prize was awarded to Edward W. Denning with the second to W. D. Hamilton and third to Karl Hasmann. The subjects are of local interest, namely "The First Treaty of Peace Between the Indians and the Dutch Settlers, at the Residence of Jonas Bronck," and "Gouverneur Morris Addressing the Constitutional Convention in the Old State House at Philadelphia." They were

unveiled June 25, 1907.

On the last day of the sixth annual exhibition, March 30, 1907, a reception was tendered to the officers of over 200 clubs (not art clubs) of New York City. It was proposed that these clubs should become affiliated members of the Municipal Art Society and that through co-operation a larger public

might be reached.

The annual meeting is held the second Wednesday in May (the next May 13, 1908, 2 P. M.). Council meetings the first Monday in each month; officers' meetings the third Monday.

An agreement was signed on April 7, 1906, between the National Academy of Design and the Society of American Artists whereby the Academy and Society were "to be united and amalgamated and hereafter form one organization for the purposes set out in the constitution of the National Academy of Design, as amended contemporaneously with the execution of this agreement." By this agreement all members of the society who were not already academicians or associates became "associates" of the academy.

The constitution of the academy as amended provides that the number of "associates" shall be unlimited, but the number of "academicians" shall be limited to 125 painters, 25 sculptors and 25 architects or engravers; that each academician and associate shall be entitled to exhibit one work exempt from jury at each of the exhibitions of the academy, when marked by a special card provided for that purpose; that such prizes as have been given to the Society of American Artists shall, if possible, be transferred to the National Academy of Design; that at the April meeting the academicians and associates shall choose by ballot a hanging committee of three members, one of whom shall be a sculptor, and this committee in conjunction with the 27 members of the committee of selection shall constitute the jury for the next annual exhibition, and these, together with the council, shall constitute the exhibition committee. The jury rules provide that a sub-committee may be elected each year by the jury from its members to solicit the exhibition of such works of art as will enhance the interest of the exhibition. These solicited works shall be placed in Class I, and exempt works by members shall be placed in Class 2, but the jury may by a two-thirds vote of those present place solicited works in Class 2 or exempt works in Class 1; they may not

place either in Class 3 or R (rejected).

At a meeting of the Alumni Association of Pratt Institute, held in June, 1905, it was voted to rent a house to be used as a club by the alumni and art students of Pratt Institute. A free course of study is open to draughtsmen and students of any city, modeled on the general plan pursued at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris,

and comprising frequent problems in Orders, Design, Archæology, etc.

The Society has established the "Paris Prize," open to any applicant in the United States, which sends one man every year to Paris and gives him \$2,000 for two years, and arranges with the administrators of the Ecole des Beaux Arts so that he is admitted, on arrival, in the first class of the school. The first man to go was Licht (1904), then Wynkoop, Hirons, and Wagner in 1907. Next competition takes place March 7, April 6 and May 16, 1908.

Ateliers are being opened and there are 700 students entered on the lists for work in the fall of 1907. There are various prizes for competitions among the students—the Pupin, the Warren, etc. There are three ateliers in New York—Jallade, Hornbostle and Barber. One of these ateliers comprises the final courses preparatory to entering Columbia University. Columbia University has arranged with one of the Beaux Arts Society Ateliers to enable the students to do at night work in connection with their regular curriculum.

The Society is largely increased in membership and holds its regular reunions and dinners from time to time during the winter. One of these occasions last winter was made a fancy dress dinner, followed by a dance.

The purpose of the Three Arts Club is to solve, if possible, the problems of the student life of the large and constantly increasing number of young women in the art circles of the city. Three seasons' work developed the need of a house with accommodations for resident members.

A house on Lexington Avenue and Sixty-second Street was rented, with accommodations for fifteen girls. In these houses, where the Club is at present located, there are accommodations for forty resident members, much larger rooms for the outside club uses. In the four years since the establishment of the work there have been 237 different girls in residence.

The "Dramatic Wardrobe" is a feature of the work which deserves special mention. It is the greatest desire of both the board and the members that the work may become self-supporting. The rent now paid is so high (\$5.700 a year for the two houses) that this will be possible only when the Club can own its building. To this end a building tund has already been started and over \$6,000 raised. Ten times the amount will be needed to purchase a suitable house. An associate membership has been established, which will consist of artists in all three professions, and artists only.

While the bulk of the collection belongs to the Piedmont Development Company, a number of wealthy citizens have lent paintings. John Martin has a large room filled with pictures that he has lent, The Home Club has a room full of art studies, and William G. Henshaw, F. M. Smith and Frank C. Havens have drawn liberally from their private collections to enrich the exhibit. One room is devoted to marines and another to studies of women.

The annual meeting is held in December. The report for 1906 showed a membership of 1,077, divided between the Park Branch and the City Branch. An amendment to the charter was made November 27, 1906, to allow the Association to work for the general improvement of the city along artistic lines instead of limiting its activities to the presentation of a particular class of works to Fairmount Park. Resolutions were passed looking toward co-operation with other organizations for the preservation of Niagara Falls and also for the removal of the duty on works of art.

A Japanese temple gate was presented to Philadelphia, through this Association, by John H. Converse and Samuel M. Vauclain, and erected in the ravine between Memorial and Horticultural Halls in the West Park, near the Lotus Pond, in December, 1905. A statue of Matthias W. Baldwin, by Herbert Adams, was erected at the corner of Broad and Spring Garden Streets and formally presented to the city on June 2, 1906. It was given, through the Association, by the firm of Burnham, Williams & Co., proprietors of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, founded by Mr. Baldwin.

A model of a "Cowboy," by Frederic Remington, was approved by the committee on works of art, and it is expected that the bronze statue will be completed by June 1, 1910.

The Association is at present engaged in an exhaustive study of the problems presented by the opening of the Fairmount Park Parkway and the preparation of plans for an effective treatment of the entrance to the park itself.

The last annual meeting of the Fellowship of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, held April 29, 1907, marked the tenth anniversary of the founding of the organization. The membership now numbers about 340 persons, growing a little every year and being added to constantly from the schools of the Academy. Since October, 1905, there have been the two annual exhibitions held at the Academy under the auspices of the Fellowship and a special exhibition of works by Frederic Nunn, held in the Fellowship Room, 201 South Eleventh Street, during the month of April, 1907. This was followed by an exhibition of selected work of the Fellowship Class. The sketch class meets every Tuesday evening during the school season and is under the guidance of Thomas P. Anshutz. The class pays its own expenses out of the 10 cent fee charged each member for each evening that he works. The feature of the year 1905-1906 was the exhibition of "Tableaux Vivants" carried out under the supervision of a committee of artists and given in aid

of the Fellowship treasury. They were given twice in the Lecture Room of the Academy on the afternoon and evening of December 20, 1905. A net

profit of \$440 was realized.

The lecture course for 1905-1906 included a reading of "Francis Drake" by the author, Dr. Weir Mitchell; a paper on "The Temptations of Eve" by the author, Agnes Repplier, and a talk on "Art and Life" by Bliss Carmen. For the year 1906-1907 the lectures included a "Talk on the Pictures in the 102d Annual Exhibition of the Pennsylvania Academy" by Charles H. Caffin; an address on "The Strolling of a Player's Head" by Dr. George McClellan an address on "The Strolling of a Player's Head" by Dr. George McClellan, and an illustrated talk on "Famous Portrait Painters of the World" by William M. Chase.

The sixth annual exhibition was held at the Academy from November 16 to November 30, 1905, and the seventh exhibition from November 6 to November 24, 1906. These are before all else artists' exhibitions, and are intended primarily for works which, by reason of their breadth of treatment or independence of idea, would not be entered in the usual exhibition. Studies and arrangements in any medium; detail studies and preliminary sketches for

important works are especially solicited.

The Gallery of National Portraiture has been organized as a department or section of the general exhibition. Beginning with the portraits of Washington, Franklin, Morris, Clymer, Hopkinson and Madison, and with the works of West, Stuart, Vanderlyn, Peale, Rush, Inman and Sully already in its possession, the Academy aims first to add to and extend the series of portraits of the founders and makers of the Republic, of the State of Pennsylvania, and of the city of Philadelphia, and of men and women notable in

American literature, science, the arts and social life.

In accordance with this, arrangements were made during the summer, and on November 18, 1905, the first exhibition of the Gallery of National Portraiture was opened. About 150 portraits were hung in Galleries A and B and the corridors, and these were divided as far as could be done into four groups of the pre-Revolutionary period, the period of the Revolution, the period between 1800 and 1850, and the period since then. The display of works by West, Stuart, Peale, Sully, Inman and Neagle was representative and exceedingly fine, while the subjects were of greatest interest. The Portrait Gallery will now be a part of the Academy's permanent exhibition, and the portraits will be arranged in Gallery B. known as the Gilpin Gallery. It is hoped that many of the portraits of distinguished men and women now in private houses will find a resting place in this gallery, which will become of far reaching and very real interest. In special cases an arrangement may be made with the Committee on Exhibition for the loan and deposit, either for a specified time or indefinitely, of family portraits of especial interest or distinction. Acceptance and confirmation by the Board of Directors of a portrait given and transferred to the Academy will provide for its care and exhibition in perpetuity in the present rooms of the institution or in the galleries which may hereafter be erected.

John Frazee: bust of Judge Joseph Hopkinson by Shobal Vail Clevenger; "Man-Cub," bronze by A. S. Calder: "Birth of Jacob and Esau," sketch by Benjamin West: "Sailing in the Mist," oil painting by John H. Twachtman; portraits of President and Mrs. Madison, of Alexander James Dallas and of Dr. John Fothergill, all by Gilbert Stuart; portrait of Henrietta Van Haaven by Schalcken: of Francis Scott Key by Charles Willson Peale: of Dr. Horace Howard Furness by Joseph De Camp: Henry Pratt by Henry Inman; "Becky Sharp" by Thomas P. Anshutz; "Road to Nice" by W. L. Pickne'l; "Boy with Violin" by Elizabeth Wentworth Roberts: "Beatrice" by W. Sergeant Kendall. Mrs. Joseph Harrison, Jr., who died July 21, 1900, willed to the Academy her collection of paintings and sculpture. The estate has, however, not yet been settled. The lectures during 1906 included a course of five lectures by Charles H. Caffin on "The Art Motives in Paintings During the Nineteenth Century," and also a course of twelve on the "History of Painting" by Charles H. Caffin. Other lecturers were Anna Caulfield, Lorado Taft and John F. Lewis.

The last annual report contains the following interesting comparison: "New York, with a population of 3,437,000, gives to the Metropolitan Museum over 2,300 members, contributing, in 1905, \$23,390. The population of Chicago is 1,698,000, and the Chicago Art Institute had that same year \$25,250 derived frim its 2,219 annual members alone. The Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, the population being 560,000, had 1,292 contributing members, giving it \$16.485; while for the past year, the population of Philadelphia being 1.293,000, more than twice that of Boston, the Academy received \$2,800 from 280 members.'

#### PENNSYLVANIA MUSEUM.

The appropriation in 1906 of \$5,000 by City Councils for the fitting up of exhibition space in the basement of Memorial Hall has permitted the opening of three rooms in the northwest corner of the building and the improvement of the stairway leading thereto. In these new apartments a portion of the collection of Colonial relics formed by Mrs. W. D. Frishmuth has been installed. For 1907 an additional appropriation of \$2,500 was obtained, and this will be used to extend the basement improvements.

The Museum Committee has extended an invitation to the school teachers of the city, through the Superintendent of Public Schools, to make use

of the exhibits for lectures or practical work.

During 1905-1906 special efforts were made to complete certain of the collections, notably the tin enameled pottery of all countries. Among the more important gifts of 1906-1907 is a collection of stained glass of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, formed by the late Dr. Francis W. Lewis, and given by Miss Mary Lewis, which has been installed on the windows of the Southeast Pavilion. Numerous purchases have been made, including eleven pieces of genuine English Lowestoft porcelain, the first collection of the kind to be exhibited in this country.

In response to appeals to the friends of the Museum for contributions to a special fund for the purchase of objects of art, the sum of \$665 was received for the year ending May 31, 1907. Through the generosity of several members of the Museum Committee the publication of the quarterly Bulletin has been continued. Of the projected series of Art Primers the following have been issued: "Tin Enameled Pottery," "Salt Glazed Stoneware," "Artificial Soft Paste Porcelain" and "Lead Glazed Pottery" (Part first). Arrangements have been made for the republication of these monographs in book form. An illustrated handbook of the Museum has been published; price, 25 cents. The work of the Bureau of Identification is firmly established. and expert information has been furnished, free of charge, to museums and to private parties.

School of Industrial Art.

By the new arrangement the Art School offers five courses of equal thoroughness and importance, and each leading to the full diploma, namely, the regular course in drawing, painting and modeling, interior decoration, applied design, illustration, and normal art. (For details of instruction see tabulated list of schools.)

Exhibits of school work were sent to the art conventions at Cleveland, Ohio, Millville, N. J., and to the exposition at Jamestown, Va. A large collection has been forwarded to the board of education of the City of Mexico upon request of the director of art education for that Government. A permanent exhibit has been installed in the Educational State Museum in the Capitol at Harrisburg.

The Alumni Associations of both the Art and Textile Schools have been active. The business bureau reports that 49 positions as designers, art workers or teachers have been filled, while about twice as many applications have been received from employers. The Association of the Textile Schools was regularly chartered during 1907. At its meetings papers on subjects of vital interest are presented and discussed.

The foundation of the Wilstach Gallery is due to the beneficence of the late Anna Wilstach, who bequeathed to Philadelphia, under the care of the Park Commissioners, the collection of paintings acquired by her husband, the late William P. It is installed in Memorial Hall, this building being under the jurisdiction of the Commissioners. The lack of space seriously hampers the proper arrangement of the paintings, as space, rather than other considerations, must be given prominence in the hanging of new acquisitions.

Some recent additions are examples of the Italian, Roman, Spanish, Flenish, French and other schools; works by Viterbo, Rubens, Snyders,

Pacheco, etc., as well as a number from the late Salon.

The eleventh celebration of Founder's Day and the dedication of the new building consisted of ceremonial receptions and addresses on April 11, 12 and 13, 1907. The new wing of the Carnegie Institute that is devoted to art has been decorated by John W. Alexander with three series of mural paintings. On the first floor are fifteen panels forming the frieze and representing the "Spirit of Toil"; at the head of the flight of stairs (see illustration) are three panels depicting Pittsburg as a strong man in armor rising on the steam and flames of the city's furnaces, to be crowned by a winged figure of "Success," while floating figures carry toward Pittsburg their gifts of literature, music and art.

On the exterior of the building there are four large bronze groups surmounting the buildings, and two bronze statues are at each entrance pavilion, all the work of J. Massey Rhind. The architects of the building are Alden & Harlow.

A few years ago Mr. Carnegie authorized the Director to purchase in his name collections of casts, drawings and photographs, to be presented on the occasion of the dedication of the enlarged Institute building. A great hall of architecture was provided in the centre of the addition to the building, measuring 125 square feet. In this hall has been arranged the group of architectural casts. The number of casts in this central group is only seventeen, but most of them are of unusual size, the largest being 86 feet long and 36 feet high. Under the balcony a much larger number of architectural casts will be installed in chronological order. Opening from this architectural hall is the hall of sculpture, its columns of Pentelic marble serving as a background for reproductions of the Parthenon pediment and other great pieces of Greek sculpture.

On the two upper floors there are ten galleries, and at the time of the opening one was filled with the sixty-seven paintings forming the permanent collection, one devoted to original drawings, and one to a collection of 313 statues, busts and various bronze articles found at Pompeii and the neighboring towns, and reproductions of objects preserved in the National Museum at

Naples.

The remaining seven galleries were devoted to the International Exhibition of paintings held from April 11 to June 13, 1907. The medal of the first class (\$1,500) was awarded to "The Bath," by Gaston La Touche; medal of the second class (\$1,000) for "Portrait of Professor Leslie W. Miller," to Thomas Eakins; medal of the third class (\$500) to "Portrait of a Woman," by Olga de Boznauska; honorable mentions were awarded to "An English Girl" by Lawton S. Parker, "Portrait of Mrs. Greiffenhagen" by Maurice Greiffenhagen, and "The Old Mill" by W. Granville-Smith.

At the previous International Exhibition, held from November 2, 1905, to January 1, 1906, the first medal was awarded to "Evening in a Studio," by Lucien Simon; second to "The Crest," by Edward W. Redfield; third to "June," by Childe Hassam; and honorable mention to "At Mouquin's" by William J. Glackens, "The Coffee Line" by John Sloan, and "Winter" by

Charles II. Woodbury.

The Annmary Brown Memorial, erected in Providence, R. I., by Gen. Rush C. Hawkins, was opened to the public on July 2. The handsome rectangular granite building, with its bronze doors showing figures of Literature and Art, holds a remarkable collection of books and paintings, ancient and modern.

The first room is devoted to the collection of examples of printing to the number of 530 volumes, many of which are not to be found even in European collections. The second room contains the modern paintings. It has two paintings by Edwin Lord Weeks, "Caravan Crossing the Desert." and "The Golden Temple"; "A Glass With the Squire" by Eastman Johnson; "La Brabanconne" by Gari Melchers; and examples by Casada, Planzeau, Bouver, J. F. Cropsey, Kaemmerer, Guerra, Trumbull, Mayon, and others. The third gallery contains several old canvases, notably a head, attributed to Hans Holbein; an interesting portrait by Sir Thomas Lawrence; "The Duke of Richmond" by Van Dyck; "Portrait of a Young Man" by Rembrandt, and works by Canaletto, Van der Meulen, Antonio Moro, Quentin Mateys, Guido Reni, Angelica Kauffman, Sir Peter Lely, and others.

Behind these rooms containing the treasures of the Museum, and terminating with a door of bronze and glass, is the marble crypt where the remains of General Hawkins will ultimately rest beside those of his wife.

The annual meeting of the corporation is held the first Wednesday in June. A new class of membership has recently been added, that of Annual Governing Members, who pay \$10 a year; the Annual Members pay \$3 a year, and Governing Members for life one payment of \$100, as heretofore.

The Museum consists of seven galleries, three of which contain oil and water color paintings and engravings; two contain a large collection of casts of the masterpieces of classic and Renaissance sculpture; one contains a fine collection of autotypes illustrating the history of painting; and one is devoted to collections of Japanese pottery, metal work and lacquer, and also to examples of pottery, furniture and textiles of other countries.

A new building has been erected to hold the collection of antique furniture, pottery, textiles and paintings, presented in 1904 to the School of Design by Mr. Charles L. Pendleton. This collection was installed in the Autumn of 1906. This Colonial House is the gift of Mr. Stephen O. Metcalf. The rooms of the Modeling Department were installed in this building in the Autumn of 1907.

A new gallery has also been built to connect the Pendleton collection with the present galleries of the School of Design, and was fitted up to contain the increasing collections of porcelains and metal work. This building

is the gift of Mrs. Gustav Radeke.

The main building, located on Waterman Street, contains in addition to the Museum the offices for administration and rooms for the Departments of Drawing and Painting, Decorative Design, Architecture, and Jewelry Design. The Chapter held nine regular meetings during 1906, with an average attendance of thirteen. Business transacted at these meetings included the appointment by the Mayor of members of the Chapter on a municipal commission. These Commissioners made recommendations two years ago for ten millions in improvements in municipal buildings. In the fall of 1906 a ten million bond issue was voted on and passed and the various hospitals, etc., are being allotted to architects without competition, by the Board of Public Improvements. The Chapter has also influenced the Library Board to assign the building of one-half dozen libraries to different architects without competition. The Art Museum in St. Louis dates a new period in its history from the World's Fair of 1904. In 1901, three years before the Exposition period, Professor Ives, having been elected a member of the Municipal Assembly. secured the passage of an ordinance empowering the Board of Control of the Art Museum to choose a site in Forest Park and erect a building thereon. The building was to be the property of the city, but was to be dedicated permanently to the purposes of the Museum as the city's tenants at will. The Exposition management perceived the value of some permanent memorial, and determined that the memorial should take the form of a permanent home for the Art Museum. In designing the structure which housed the Art Department, this ultimate object was kept in view, as well as the immediate necessities of light and space for the temporary exhibits of the World's Fair.

The "Art Palace" took the form of four "pavilions" enclosing an open quadrangle, of which three were temporary, while one, the central structure. which housed the American section, was to remain as the permanent home of the collections of the Saint Louis Art Museum. This permanent building is very solidly constructed of stone and brick, at a cost of some three-quarters of a million dollars, and presents features of beauty.

In due course, the collections which had so long been housed in the old building at Nineteenth Street were removed to the Park, where they are now to be seen to so much greater advantage. In addition to the collections installed in the old building, the Director had stored a number of important bulky works obtained through the Columbian Exposition and other sources, with a view to just such an opportunity as was now presented. In addition to this, the Department of Art of the St. Louis Exposition had made a remarkable display of American sculpture far exceeding anything before attempted, and many important examples of this display were acquired for

the permanent collection of the Museum, by purchase or by gift.

With the acquisition of the beautiful permanent building in the Park, the work of expanding the Museum of Fine Arts was but begun. The funds available for its maintenance had been so small that, with the most rigid economies, there had been deficits of several thousand dollars a year at the old building; and the cost of maintaining the Museum in the new would be much greater, while those upon whom the burden of the deficit had fallen were quite unwilling to continue to meet it. Under these circumstances, broad plans for the augmentation of the institution were set before the friends of the Museum and the public. A fund of about \$65,000 was raised to meet certain expenses of maintenance in the new building for the first five years. An active campaign was carried on to increase the annual membership of the institution, with such success that, from a total membership of about 250 in 1905, the membership at the end of 1907 is increased to about 2,500, and the income from this source increased to nearly \$25,000. In American paintings, the W. K. Bixby American Art Acquisition Fund was established by gift from Mr. Bixby, and added \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year to the funds available for purchases of American art. This gift of Mr. Bixby has added to the permanent collection works by John La Farge, Horatio Walker, Dwight W. Tryon, George Fuller, William Morris Hunt, Birge Harrison, Edmund C. Tarbell, and others.

Meanwhile was urged the importance of art education as a factor in the development of the West, and the Southwest particularly, and its relation to St. Louis as the strategic point in the development of a great region of the country. Legislation was prepared for consideration by the General Assembly to provide that, upon the petition of one hundred voters in a city of a certain class, asking that a special tax be levied for the establishment of a City Art Museum Fund and naming a rate therefor not to exceed one-fifth of a mill on the dollar of the city's taxable values, there should be submitted to the voters of the city at the next election therein, the question whether such a fund should be established by the levy of such a tax; and to provide that, if a majority of the voters voting upon the proposition so submitted should vote in favor thereof, the tax should be levied and the fund established; and to provide various rules and regulations to govern management and expenditure of the Art Museum Fund. This legislation was enacted in February, 1907. A petition of the character required was immediately presented to the proper authorities in the manner described by the Act. Municipal legislation to carry into effect the provisions of the Act was also obtained. The question of the establishment of the fund was thereupon submitted to the voters at the election on April 2, 1907; 26,306 votes were cast

and 7.873 votes against the proposition.

Under the terms of the Act of the General Assembly, this vote established the Art Museum Fund. The tax of one-fifth of a mill on the taxable values of the city was accordingly included in the tax levy for 1907-1908. The amount to be yielded in this fiscal year is stated by the Comptroller as \$102,000. The tax will increase with the general tax revenues of the city and

is expected to double in about a decade.

Meanwhile, other work in extending the influence of the Museum and School had been inaugurated, which is now being carried on with energy. New endowment funds are being established, the scope of the School of Technical Instruction broadened, and the attendance increased; and other educational and Museum extension work is under way. In the last year sixteen special exhibitions have been held in the galleries at Forest Park, and sixty-five lectures for the benefit of annual members, students and the public have been given in connection with the work.

#### ESSEX INSTITUTE.

The new building was opened September 9, 1907. Begun nearly a century ago by the Essex Historical Society, the exhibit of the Institute is now regarded as the most complete in the country. The collection of 130 canvases which the Institute has acquired is displayed on the walls of the art gallery on the second floor of the new building, while in cases in the centre of the room are collections of coins from nearly every port in which Salem mariners traded. A case of Hindoo miniatures and other cases containing relics of the witchcraft period make the whole room extremely interesting.

A large doorway, over which is a wooden balcony taken from an old Salem assembly hall, leads to a hall which typifies the method of living of the early settlers of this country. One side of the hall is partitioned off into three small rooms, one representing a kitchen, another a bedroom and the third a parlor. The kitchen, even to the beams in the ceiling, is furnished after the style of 1750, and the bedroom and parlor, which contain rare

pieces of mahogany, are of a period fifty years later.

Incorporated July, 1889. Affiliated with the University of California, February, 1893, and at the same time it entered into possession of the property it now occupies under the terms of an agreement whereby the owner, Mr. Edward F. Searles, deeded it to the Regents of the University for the exclusive uses and purposes of instruction in and illustration of the fine arts, music and literature, or any of them, including the maintenance of galleries and reading rooms, and other suitable means of such instruction and illustration, under the title of The Mark Hopkins Institute of Art. The buildings of The Mark Hopkins Institute were destroyed in the great fire which devastated the city in 1906, and a new agreement was entered into with the Regents of the University and Mr. Searles under which the Art Association retained possession of the former site and erected thereon a temporary building, opened June 6, 1907, wherein are displayed such pictures and statues as were saved from the fire, together with subsequent additions to the collection; in this building also is conducted the School of Design, the whole being comprehended under the title of The San Francisco Institute of Art. The present building is the precursor of a more elaborate one which it is the intention to erect in the future. Meantime the Association is enlarging its collection which is on permanent exhibition, while special exhibitions are held at frequent intervals.

It is planned to purchase works from the Exposition for the permanent collection.

Owing to lack of space and to insufficient funds, it was necessary to discontinue the drawing classes and the lecture courses. On the other hand, the almost daily talks to pupils of public and private schools, women's educational

clubs and the Museum art history study clubs, conducted during the season at the Museum, have been most successful and profitable.

The noonday talks on art subjects given in the various factories led to the establishment of a Business Girl's Club, which meets at the Museum the first Monday evening of every month. The Public Library reports that the increase in the use of art literature in 1906 was 50 per cent. over the previous year, the largest increase in any department of the libraries. Beginning November, 1907, a monthly bulletin is to be published.

During the summer of 1906 two new galleries and a workroom were added to the ground floor, thus enabling the Museum to be kept open con-

tinuously.

Among the most notable acquisitions during 1907 is the fine collection of Egyptian antiquities presented to the Museum by its president, Mr. E. D. Libbey. The second important gift is that of Mr. Abraham M. Chesbrough, who has presented to the Museum eight important pictures by Russian artists. Mr. E. D. Libbey presented four paintings to the collection, including one by E. H. Osthaus and one by Henry Mosler; Dr. H. A. Tobey presented two small paintings by Leon Charles; a number of casts have been received; Mrs. E. D. Libbey presented thirty colored reproductions of the works of the early Italian masters, which have been hung in the library; and Henry Mosler, the father of the late Gustave Mosler, presented four preliminary sketches made for his gold medal picture, "De Profundis," which is the property of the Museum.

The Thirty-ninth Annual Convention was held at The Octagon, Washington. D. C., January 9, 10, 11, 1906. Attention was called to the unfortunate

conditions which exist in the manner of conducting competitions, and a lengthy report on the subject was read and discussed. Municipal improvements were discussed, and papers read on "The Improvement of the Schuyl-kill River Banks," "Contemplated Improvements of the City of Brooklyn," "Artistic Development of Paris." A full report was given of the proposed improvements at Manila.

The Fortieth Annual Convertion and celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the foundation of the Institute was held at Washington, December 29, 1906, and January 7, 8, 9, 1907. The annual report published in the autumn of 1907 states: That the Institute has 763 members of which 331 are Fellows and 432 Associate; as well as 62 Honorary and 82 Corresponding

members.

A new Chapter was formed in 1906 at Atlanta, Ga., making a total of 28. The Institute established a gold medal for distinguished achievement in architecture, and the first award was made to Sir Aston Webb, R. A., at the time of the celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Foundation of the Institute, January 8, 1907. The medal was designed by the sculptor, Adolph A. Weinman.

Also at the Fiftieth Anniversary a tablet in honor of the founders of the Institute and those who joined them in framing the Constitution, was erected

in The Octagon, from the design by Edgar V. Seeler.

The debt on The Octagon House was wiped out and all the bonds redeemed. It was resolved that an endowment fund of possibly \$500,000, be raised for the improvement of The Octagon and to establish an architectural post graduate course.

The Division of Prints is open every week day from 9 a. ni. to 4:30 p. m., and on Sunday from 2 p. m. to 10 p. m.

This division has charge of the collection of prints, and also of the books

and periodicals relating to art and architecture.

The prints, including photographs, now number 255,870, an increase of 39,546 over the past year. These represent material acquired by copyright,

purchase, gift, transfer and exchange

A notable gift of the year was a collection of original drawings, prints and books by Japanese artists, presented by Mr. Crosby S. Noyes, of Washington, D. C., which includes 12 water colors, 145 original drawings, 331 wood engravings, 97 lithographs, 658 illustrated books, also netsukes, sword-

guards, bronzes, carvings in wood, ivory, etc.

The collection of prints belonging to the late George Lothrop Bradley, of Washington, D. C., has now, in accordance with his will, become a permanent and valuable possession of the Library. It comprises 1,466 engravings,

361 reproductions, 153 photographs and a few illustrated art works. The Japanese Government has presented a collection of 301 photographs of Japanese paintings, drawings, wood carvings, sword-guards, interior

decorations of temples, etc.

Among the most valuable purchases are a collection of about 27,000 photographs of paintings and sculpture in European galleries, and of foreign architecture; 305 Japanese colored wood engravings by celebrated artists; 2,300 photographs taken by Brady during the Civil War; 925 protographs of objects in the Boston Museum of Fine Arts; a collection of 1,700 photographs formed by William Eleroy Curtis, illustrating the life of Christopher

A special exhibit of the year, commemorative of the tercentenary of Rembrandt's birth, has occupied the west-south gallery. It consists of a collection of 264 etchings, 37 copies and reproductions, and 255 reproductions of his paintings, drawings and sketches. The completeness of this exhibit has been made possible by drawing upon the T. Harrison Garrett (a loan of 19,113 engravings), the Gardner Greene Hubbard and the George Lothrop Bradley collections.

The prints presented by the German and French governments, and a collection of engravings by old masters, lent by a collector, have remained on exhibition, but will be replaced by others during the coming year.

The public has shown unusual interest in the exhibitions and general work of the Division. Art classes and educational institutions in the district

have found the photographs of great assistance in their study.

From July 1, 1905, to June 30, 1907, the readers have numbered 13.652. 20.875 books, 14,436 periodicals, 35,039 photographs and engravings, and 299,739 stereoscopic views have been issued.

# NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART.

Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C.

#### WILLIAM H. HOLMES, Curator.

According to the charter of the Smithsonian Institution it has always been the rightful custodian of all works of art belonging to the Federal Government, and when its first board of regents met, plans for a national gallery were discussed and determined upon. In 1849 the valuable series of prints assembled by the Hon. George P. Marsh was purchased for about \$4,000. The yearly exhibition in the upper Smithsonian Hall consisted mainly of the collection of Indian portraits and scenes by J. M. Stanley, C. B. King and others, but in the fire of 1865 this section of the gallery, with its contents, was entirely destroyed. The objects on the lower floor escaped injury and were deposited for safekeeping in the Library of Congress and the Corcoran

Gallery, where they remained until about ten years ago.

In January. 1906, the board of regents accepted the gift of Charles L.

Freer, of Detroit, of his collection of paintings, etchings and drawings by
Whistler, works by Abbott Thayer, T. W. Dewing, Dwight Tryon and others, and Oriental paintings and pottery, valued at about \$600,000. This collection has been deeded to the Smithsonian Institution, but will be retained by the donor during his lifetime. It is eventually to be housed in Washington in a separate building, also the gift of Mr. Freer, to be designed under his supervision and to cost about \$500,000.

In July, 1906, the Harriet Lane Johnston collection was acquired through a decision of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, essentially reaffirming the intent of the fundamental act, that the custodianship of the National Gallery of Art was vested in the Smithsonian Institution. The lecture room of the National Museum was remodeled, and therein in November, 1906, were installed the Harriet Lane Johnston collection, comprising portraits by Romney, Reynolds, Lawrence, Hoppner and others. These, with several loans and donations, fully occupy the existing wall space. Among the loans are twenty-one paintings from the Lucius Tuckerman collection, and among the gifts one from the Hon. J. B. Henderson and one from Miss Eleanor Blodgett, of New York. In March, 1907, William T. Evans, of Montclair, N. J., offered to the

National Gallery a collection of paintings by contemporary American artists, which was promptly accepted. Unfortunately no place could be found in the Museum for this valuable collection, but through the courtesy of the Trustees of the Corcoran Gallery of Art, these fifty paintings were placed on view in the atrium of the Corcoran Gallery as a loan collection. They comprise works by Inness, Wyant, Homer Martin, Winslow Homer, John La Farge, Walter Shirlaw, Ranger, C. H. Davis, J. Francis Murphy, Dewing, Tryon and others.

At the present time the National Gallery has no fund for maintenance

or acquisition, but provision will, it is thought, be soon made for it by

Congress.

The Society drafted a bill for a National Advisory Board on Civic Art; was instrumental in having said bill introduced in House of Representatives by Hon. William H. Wiley, and referred to Committee on Library, and introduced in the Senate by Mr. Newlands, and referred to the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds.

It aided the Society of Washington Artists in holding its spring exhibition for 1906, and the Washington Water Color Club in holding its autumn

exhibition during same year.

Congress appropriated \$4,000 for the investigation of both the tunnel and open valley scheme of Rock Creek Park, and that the bill included the open valley scheme is due to the efforts of the National Society of the Fine Arts.

In addition to the regular course of lectures for the members of the Society, it arranged for a series of six free art lectures, which were given during the winter of 1907 in the Carnegie Public Library. A similar course of free lectures has been arranged for the ensuing season of 1908.

The Society aided the Third International Congress for the Advancement of Drawing and Art Teaching, to be held in London during the sum-

mer of 1908.

The board of managers passed a resolution endorsing the objects of the

American Free Art League.

The board of managers of the Society also passed a resolution commending the "American Art Annual" as an invaluable book of reference and recommending its purchase by libraries and art societies.

It has arranged for an exhibition of framed textiles, 500 or more, to be held during February, 1908, in the Corcoran Gallery of Art. The textiles have been lent by the Boston Art Museum.

At a caucus of the charter members of the Association, held in St. Louis, May 15, 1907, the above officers were nominated, and the ticket submitted by mail to each of the members has since received the necessary two-thirds vote. Membership fee is \$5.

The objects of the Association include a revision of the copyright laws to protect fine arts production (for this they are co-operating with the Print Dealers' Association); the discouragement of habitual price cutting; to improve and aid all means tending to educate and stimulate interest in art; to aid the movement for the revision of the tariff on original works of art; and to promote social and amicable relations between the various members of the Association.

This Association was started in 1903 with four members; it now numbers fifteen houses, who represent the leading work in their respective lines. The general purpose of the Association is to promote the interests of the art trade generally, and is uncompromisingly opposed to piracy in any form or the selling of any goods under misrepresentation.

One of the first and primary purposes of the organization was that of securing better copyright laws, and to this end it has done effective work. As a complement to its copyright work, it is unalterably opposed to piracy, and its members are on record against the appropriation of the work of others, regardless of whether it is fully protected technically or not. In this particular it is endeavoring to inculcate a higher code of ethics in the publishing field than has heretofore existed in this country.

Probably the most important thing engaging the attention of the Association is its attitude with regard to spurious goods. It will not countenance the sale or use of copies as originals any more than it will countenance the making and marketing of prints from copies and selling them to the public as prints made from the original works of art, or the selling of prints made by an inferior process as genuine prints made by a superior process. It is not arrayed against cheap goods or cheap prints, for it recognizes that there is a definite and legitimate field for each form of expression of art that is genuine of its kind.

An exhibition of the work of the various publishing houses that are members of the Association was held at the Hotel Imperial, New York, during the week beginning August 26, 1907. Not the least important of the results accomplished is the feeling of friendship which has been built up between the members of the Association.
