#### SUMMER FIRE **RULES GO INTO EFFECT MAY 1**

Utmost caution in use of any of fire in fire hazard areas of the county was urged this week by officials charged with week by officials charged with fire control responsibility. Strict no-smoking and other rules are announced by W. W. "Butch" Skinner, State Ranger in charge of San Bernardino County and Donald R. Bauer, Forest Super-visor, San Bernardino National

Forest.

High fire hazard areas in the county and all of the Forest were posted May 1 with "No Smoking" signs. Rangers in an effort to save watershed and timber lands will enforce Sec. 9 and 11 of County Ordinance 533.

Smoking in the posted areas will be permitted only at improved campgrounds, habitations and posted smoking areas. Smoking in any moving vehicle or discarding of any business or abstence in ing of any burning substance is prohibited.

Residents of the mountain areas are urged to comply with Section 12 of Ordinance 533 by removal of all inflammable vegetation for a minimum distance of thirty feet

mum distance of thirty feet around each building on their property by June 1st.

Special permits are required before building any type of outdoor fire in the high fire hazard areas. Permits may be obtained, free of charge in the foothill areas from the State Forest Fire Control Stations and within the San Bernardino National Forest from the nearest Ranger Station.
