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SEARCH, SEIZURE LAW'S REPEAL

Election to Bring Liberal Legislatures, He Says. |

Analysis of the state legislative situation from the wet and dry standpoint was made public yesterday by A. D. Mlwmondon, chairman of the Illinois division of the National Association Opposed to Prohibition.

With prospects of a wet house of representatives and a damp senate, they will seek to have the search and seizure law repealed, a new and safe law enacted, as one of the first tests of strength.

Predicts Liberal legislature

The revolt against radical dry legislation has at last reached the stage where concrete political results are in sight, Air. Plamondon said.

For the first time in years the state of Illinois will have a legislature in harmony with the liberal sentiments of its people. The house of representatives unquestionably will be wet, and the senate is expected to be damp.

In thirty-five senatorial districts the major parties nominated only three candidates each for the lower house, which makes the nomination practically certain to an election. Of the one hundred and candidates nominated in those districts, with one or two seats in doubt, the lineups are 65 liberals and 40 dries.

In the sixteen remaining districts the decision comes at the November election. A close study of the situation in these districts encourages the belief that 21 to 24 seats out of the 48 will fall to the wets and 24 to 27 to the dries.

Expects Dries to Lose.

A serious variation from these figures is improbable, and there is a practical certainty that membership of the house of representatives will stand as follows: Wet, 86 to 89; dry, 64 to 67.

Madison county, which has hardly a single dry precinct, gradually is eliminating the representatives who vote contrary to the sentiments of their constituents. At the last session of the general assembly some of the eleven dry representatives revolted and were blacklisted by the Anti-Saloon league.

During the recent campaign the League bestowed its endorsement on nine candidates for the lower house. Four of these were defeated. Four others, IL P. Castle, R. E. Church, Mrs. Rena Elrod, and Mrs. J. P. Goode were nominated with a practical certainty of reelection. While the ninth candidate, David I. Swanson, was given the opportunity to explain his record to the voters of the overwhelmingly liberal Englewood district at the fall election.

The state senate heretofore has been bone dry, but a change is unquestionably on the way. The wets, holding 20 seats, were compelled to defend 16 of them, while only four held over. The dries, on the other hand, had 21 holdovers.

Some Close Contests.

The prospects are that the wets will return in larger force than before. Much depends on the result of the contests in the eleventh and twenty-third districts. In the Englewood district, Donald H. McGilvray, dry Republican, faces Thomas J. Courtney, liberal Democrat, while in the twenty-third district [northwest side near Oak Park], the present dry senator, NJowell B. Mason, is opposed by Warren Phinney, who favors modification. The wets have an excellent chance to win both seats, as the districts are strongly liberal.

If, however, the state senate should unexpectedly assume an attitude of defiance to the will of the majority, we may look forward to a battle all along the line in 1928, when the terms of twenty-one dry senators come to an end. The result can easily be foreseen.
