It's like the story of the fellow who complained that he had no shoes until he saw a man with no feet. The Lord has a purpose for each of us. He has been preparing and is preparing us for that purpose. If some things are not exactly as we would have them, we have no right to complain. Such a complaint would be the same thing as telling the Lord that He did not know what He was doing. You know, Sweetheart, often the Lord has used me mightily. I am only thinking about it and trusting the Lord to show the way. Your opinion will mean much as I make a decision. Or perhaps I could go to China as a professor in some subject - perhaps philosophy. In that way I can have a means of an effective witness. I am
