My darling Doris,

Sweetheart, here are all the papers that I amnsupposed to send. Now, it is up to you to bring all these papers IMMEDIATELY to the American Consul in STOCKHOLM. There is nothing more for me to do. The rest is up to you. You must tell them that you must BE IN the States on or before this December 28th. If you arrive later, we cannot marry. You MUST BE IN THE STATES ON OR BEFORE THE 28th of DECEMBER, 1948. As soon as you know when you will arrive in the States, let me know. Tell me all the details about your arrival: the ship, arrival date, etc.

We have called the Swedish-American Lines. If you arrange passage aboard that line, we can pay for your whole passage in Chicago. We can buy your boat ticket from Goteborg to New York, and your train ticket from New York to Chicago. All these tickets will be sent to you by air-mail. First of all you must make reservation; then we will have the tickets sent to you. You will make only boat reservation; we can made the train reservations.

Darling, do you need any money? Ifuyourneed any money, we will be glad to send you whatever you need. But if you do not need any, we would rather not send any to Sweden. We are afraid that even if you did receive Money from us, you will be unable to take it out of Sweden. There will be no expenses aboard ship; but you will need ten or twenty dollars for food and other small idems aboard the train.

And of course, we don't want you to be without enough money in the case of emergency. If you get to the States and need to have some more money, all you need to do is to send us a telegram collect (we pay for the telegram in Chicago); we then will telegraph you whatever money you need.

Tonight I expect to leave for Wheaton again. Tomorrow is Friday and I will return tomorrow evening. Before I go, I'll try to answer your letters. Remember, I love you.
